## Wednesday Evening Coed

Wu Tang Forever Claims Three A Division Crowns in Historic Effort. Muckdogs Earn Two B Division Victories. Booze Hounds Win B Title

To the delight of members of the Wednesday Evening Coed league of Softball America, play was able to commence on April 7th in 2021, unlike the previous year when the entire spring season was claimed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

SPRING The spring season saw the lowest enrollment of the year, with only 9 teams committing to playing. Most prominent were the defending champions Wu Tang Forever, who had capped their 2020 with a fall season A Division championship. There were also a number of veteran teams who had played in the league for years, including Turtles, Muckdogs, Custom Cabinetry Finishes, and Chico's Bail Bonds. Encouragingly, the league saw a fair number of teams who had joined the league more recently as well; for example, Altek Hard Drivers, The Screwballs, Dugout Sharks, and Warning Track Power. The playoffs were structured with the same novel format used in Fall 2020; teams finishing the regular season in 1st through 4th place would vie for a spot in the "A Flight" finals in a preliminary round of games. Losers of that round would move to another separate round of playoffs involving the 5th and 6th place teams to decide the "B Flight" finalists. Competition would be tight, with 9 teams contending for 6 playoff spots. Regular Season The defending champions Wu Tang Forever rolled to an $8-0$ spring season, scoring 180 runs along the way, while allowing only 46 . Hagan's Heroes, Wu Tang Forever, and Wackers/Scudz Sports Claim A Division Titles. JT Bankers Saloon \& Eatery, Hit \& Run, Bonsall Bat and Van Fossen's Vikings Earn B Division Crowns.

The Sunday Afternoon Coed league of Softball America began in mid-April with the spring season, unlike in 2020 when COVID-19 necessitated a spring cancellation. The final pitch was thrown in early November, well in advance of the holidays to the relief of many.

## SPRING

Eagerly taking the field on April 18th were 20 teams, a good sign, as that vastly exceeded the enrollment seen in Spring 2019 ( 14 teams). A format featuring three divisions for varying levels of play was adopted for the spring season, and the playoffs followed a standard single-elimination format with a best-of-three finals series in each division.

## A Division

In the A Division, defending champs (Fall 2020) Hagan's Heroes swept the field with a perfect 8-0 record to secure pole position in the playoffs. Back a few games were Wu Tang Forever (5-3), Long Shots (5-3), Hattrick's Sports Bar and Grill (4-4), and Wire 2 Wire (2-6). Wackers/Scudz Sports (0-8) had a disastrous time, but would return with a vengeance in the summer and fall seasons as they built their team. Hagan's Heroes already possessed a star-studded roster and were led by Keith Keppley (.727 AVG, . 727 OBP, 1.182 SLG, 12 R, 4 2B, 2 HR, 10 RBI), Gary Thompson (. 581 AVG, .871 SLG, 19 R, 2 HR, 11 RBI), Jay Pane (. 621 AVG, 793 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 20 RBI), and the husband-wife team of Ron Pulli (. 677 AVG, .903 SLG, 12 R, 21 H, 2 3B, 13 RBI) and Kris Pulli (. 440 AVG, .517 OBP, 9 R, $11 \mathrm{H}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ ). Wu Tang Forever was not short on star power either, and John Erb (. 615 AVG, 1.192 SLG, 16 R, 4 HR, 10 RBI), Jay Cybok (. 667 AVG, .792 SLG, 11 R, 10 RBI), male eddie Richard Stead (. 636 AVG, .955 SLG, 3 3B, 11 RBI), and female eddies Katie O'Toole (. 474 AVG, 7 R) and Gina Tyson (. 429 AVG, 7 R) paved the way. Jarrett Kerns (. 815 OBP, 17 R, 3 3B) had a monster season for Long Shots, leading the division with . 833 AVG, 1.542 SLG, 20 RBI, and 37 TB, and teammates Trey Upsey (. 667 AVG, .917 SLG, 12 R, 6 2B), male eddie Tom Strowhouer (. 591 AVG, 1.091 SLG, 8 R, 3 HR, 12 RBI ), and female eddie Tara Soler (. 444 AVG, . 474 OBP, 8 H ) rounded out the attack. Hattrick's Sports Bar and Grill witnessed great efforts from Kyle Rizzi (. 778 AVG, 1.444 SLG, 11 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI ), Matt Friend ( 739 AVG, 1.087 SLG, 13 R, 4 2B, 10 RBI), male eddie Glenn Strattis (. 542 AVG, . 708 SLG, 6 R, 11 RBI), and female eddie Linda Luscombe (. 429 AVG, . 478 OBP, 5 RBI). Wire 2 Wire saw male eddie Carmen Brancato (. 500 AVG, .650 SLG, 7 R) and female eddie Brianna Brancato (. 400 AVG, .423 OBP, 5 R) shine, while Gabriel Morales (. 565 AVG, 1.043 SLG, 8 R, 3 3B) added some punch. There weren't many highlights for Wackers/Scudz Sports in the spring, but male eddie Eden Harvest (.818 AVG, 6 R) led the division with .818 OBP, and Angie Georgiadis (. 214 AVG, .421 OBP) was tops with 5 BB. Moving to the playoffs, \#4 seed Hattrick's Sports Bar and Grill fended off \#5 seed Wire 2 Wire (16-4) to advance to the semis, but \#1 seed Hagan's Heroes stood their ground (116) to secure themselves a spot in the finals. Meanwhile, \#2 seed Wu Tang Forever held firm in a nail-biter (10-9) over \#3 seed Long Shots to earn their finals berth. In the best-of-

we will stay at 4-3-2 (4 eddies in the line-up, 3 eddies in the field of which 2 of the eddies in the field must be female) for at least 1 more year.

With help from the league rules committee (Curt Hensman, Joe DeSousa, Bill Shipe, Connie Georgiadis, and Bill Shallcross), 2 proposed new rules and 1 proposed rule amendment are being considered. The first new rule is the option for teams to use a Designated Pitcher. A Designated Pitcher (dp) will allow any player who can no longer swing the bat or run the bases an opportunity to play. A (dp) must apply to the league for the status of Designated Pitcher (dp) before the start of any season. Once acquired, Designated Pitcher status is reversible only after 1 calendar year ( 3 full softball seasons) and upon request. A player's (dp) status in one league will apply to any and all Softball America leagues in which the (dp) plays. A (dp) can be used as a pitcher ONLY and is prohibited from batting under any circumstances. Teams using a (dp) are still required to bat 9 players. Batting 8 would result in the team taking a batting out. A team cannot take the field with less than 8 in the batting line-up.

Also being considered for 2022 is the structure of coed league line-ups. Coed batting line-ups may soon consist of at least 2 females (in any order) in the first 4 batting line-up slots. Male eddies shall not be factored into the female requirement. As long as 2 females bat in either of the first 4 line-up spots, a line-up shall be considered legal. A team missing the 2nd female would be required to take a batting out in one of the first 4 slots where the 2 nd female would have batted if she were present.

Finally, the all-star/eddie rule will return after a 2-year COVID hiatus, but with a potential slight twist. In years past, the rule prohibited not more than 5 coed all-stars in a coed line-up. The proposed rule amendment would allow for an unlimited number of all-stars in a coed line-up as long as the team has met the following requirements. A coed team playing with 4 or fewer all-stars will not be affected by the a/e rule and can bat and field as few as 4 eddies (minimum 2 females). A coed team playing 5 all-stars must bat 5 eddies, 4 of which must be female with not less than 2 females playing the field. A coed team playing 6 or more all-stars must bat 6 eddies, 5 of which must be female with not less than 2 females playing the field.

I, along with the members of the rules committee, believe these proposed rule additions and amendments will go a long way in making the league more fun for more people. The Designated Pitcher rule will open the game up to players that might otherwise not be able to play. Having 2 females in the top 4 batting line-up spots will make the coed leagues more coed-like instead of some coed leagues containing teams that are the equivalent of men's league teams with a few girls sprinkled in. It will also result in a much-needed status elevation of the female player. Most girls are consistently treated like also-rans batting at the bottom of the batting order. The revised all-star/eddie rule will allow any and all teams from 2021 to remain intact. The only caveat is the more all-stars a team bats, and they can have as many as they'd like, the more females a team must have in the batting line-up. No need for any team to break apart. The only affect this provision will have on even the strongest team is they might have to add a female or 2 to their batting line-up. This should help make for better competition league wide.

Umpire in Chief Curt Hensman will conduct a coed league manager meeting this year at some point before the season begins. When the time and place is determined, announcements will be made on the SBA website, Facebook, and Twitter. Curt, along with other league umpires will be happy to answer any and all coed manager questions with regard to new rules as well as existing rules. There really isn't a need for a men's manager meeting as men's league rules are quite straight forward and a lot easier to understand. There is also the possibility Curt will have with him the Scudz Sportz championship shirts for the 2021 winning managers.

One-pitch tournaments are always great events. This year we will attempt to cover all the 1-pitch tournament bases with 2 draft coed affairs on Memorial and Labor Day Sundays. A Men's Fall Classic 1-pitch event where full teams are entered with roster restrictions is slated for October. An all-eddie, male and female 1-pitch draft tournament is on the agenda for early July. If we can't get enough participants, although I believe we can, we will drop the minimum male eddie age requirement for the tourney from 52 to 50 , then 45 if need be. As long as league members continue to respect the game and the ball field grounds, I have absolutely no problem organizing and running these events.

Plan your softball year in advance armed with the knowledge that regular season games will NOT be played on Easter Sunday, Memorial Day and Labor Day Sundays and Mondays. Games in 2022 will also NOT be played on Monday, July 4th. Games WILL be played on Mother's and Father's Day Sundays as well as Halloween Monday.

The scheduling format for the Sunday Men's league will stay pretty much the same as in years past with 5 separate divisions of play. Much like last year, single leagues such as Tuesday and Friday Men's will run as one division. Schedules in leagues that have a wide disparity of talent from top to bottom much like the Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday Coed leagues will either be run in 2 divisions ( $A$ and $B$ ) or be divided into 2 equal leagues (American and National). With equally divided leagues (American and National), there will be no A or B division for the regular season. There will only be an American League and a National League. Teams will play each team in their own league and a couple of teams in the other league. Once the regular season is complete, the top finishers in each league will play for the A title. The remaining eligible seeds in each league will play for the B title.

In the heat of competition, obscenities are bound to happen. I realize that. The game umps realize that as well. What I would like ask at this point is for ball players to keep the obscenities to a small minimum, especially when women and children are in attendance and/or when the game is played in a park setting. I've had numerous complaints in years past

Playoff Player of the Year nominations are a result of formula based on the following categories: R\%, RBI\%, Avg, SIg, BB\%. Core players require a minimum of 27 ABs (including BBs) to qualify. Eddies require 24 ABs . The league's top 10 players are listed below.

Hit \& Run (5-3) claimed the \#4 spot, trailed by Alaskan Bullworms (3-5), and Slap a Pitch (2-5-1); this comprised the "B Flight" qualifiers for the playoffs. EnVi (2-6) narrowly missed the playoff cut, but improved on their spring season performance by two games, and Dirt Dogs (0-8) would have to wait until the fall for redemption. For Hagan's Heroes, male eddie Ron Pulli ( 833 OBP, 1.077 SLG, $19 \mathrm{R}, 4$ 2B, 17 RBI ) slashed an .846 AVG to claim the batting title, while teammates Keith Keppley (. 684 AVG, 1.143 SLG, 22 R, 3 HR, 24 RBI), Anthony Romeo (. 774 AVG, 1.097 SLG, 13 R, 24 RBI), Jay Pane (. 719 AVG, .750 OBP, . 938 SLG, 23 R, 20 RBI, 4 BB), and female eddies Kris Pulli (. 591 AVG, .667 OBP, 16 R, 6, RBI, 7 BB), Brittany Ullman (. 441 AVG, .500 SLG, 16 R, 2 2B, 8 RBI), and Kaelyn Motts (. 647 AVG, .706 SLG, 9 R, 8 RBI ) added fuel to the fire. Wackers/Scudz Sports saw strong efforts from Alex Freeman (. 679 AVG, . 719 OBP, 1.357 SLG, 19 R, 7 2B, 13 RBI, 4 BB), Jake Haber (. 684 AVG, 1.737 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 4 HR, 19 RBI), Bill Brancato (. 625 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 15 R, 3 3B, 12 RBI), Nick Pigott (. 680 AVG, .960 SLG, 15 RBI), and Brandon Aponte (. 737 AVG, 1.105 SLG, $10 \mathrm{R}, 14 \mathrm{RBI}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ ), as well as female eddie Lissa Tercha (. 480 AVG, . $880 \mathrm{SLG}, 14 \mathrm{R}, 6$ extra-base hits, 12 RBI ) and male eddie Carman Brancato (. 556 AVG, .833 SLG, 10 R, 3 2B, 8 RBI, 7 BB). For Long Shots, Evan Porter (. 710 AVG, 1.710 SLG, 19 R) led the conference with 7 2B, $8 \mathrm{HR}, 35 \mathrm{RBI}$, and 53 TB, and teammates Ed Decker (. 793 AVG, 1.414 SLG, 21 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI, 41 TB), Derek Strowhouer ( .577 AVG, 1.308 SLG, 11 R, $3 \mathrm{HR}, 14 \mathrm{RBI}$ ), and male eddie Glenn Strattis (. 542 AVG, .625 SLG, 7 RBI) made this team formidable. Male eddie Neal Hebert (. 542 AVG, .593 OBP, .625 SLG, 14 R, 4 BB) of Hit \& Run posted another solid campaign, while Brian Randazzo (. 680 AVG, 1.480 AVG, 11 R, 5 HR, 18 RBI), Manny Stoupakis (. 667 AVG, 1.208 SLG, 10 R, 11 RBI ), and Matt Korn (. 588 AVG, 1.353 SLG, 12 RBI ) rounded out the offense. The Alaskan Bullworms were lifted by the performances of Calvin Starosta (. 682 AVG, 1.364 SLG, 16 R, 3 HR, 16 RBI) and female eddie Jess Healy (. 583 AVG, .625 SLG, 9 R, 7 RBI). Though Slap a Pitch's playoff aspirations weren't met, Harrison Miller (. 600 AVG, 1.120 SLG, 9 R, 4 3B, 11 RBI) and JR Hilsee (. 684 AVG, .842 SLG, 7 RBI) provided some highlights. For EnVi, male eddie Kevin Ryan (. 818 AVG, 1.182 SLG, $12 \mathrm{R}, 6 \mathrm{AB}, 9 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) continued on his tear, while Bill Schnakenberg (. 818 AVG, .955 SLG, 12 R), and Matt Bauer ( .571 AVG, .857 SLG, 12 RBI) added offense as well. Though their season was not marked with success, Dirt Dogs saw good production from Elijah Robinson (. 500 AVG, . 889 SLG, 8 RBI) and Gene Schwendeman (. 563 AVG, .750 SLG, 7 R). In the "A Flight" playoffs, \#3 seed Long Shots powered through \#2 seed Wackers/Scudz Sports (20-4), then spoiled the "three-peat" bid of \#1 seed Hagan's Heroes in a narrow win (9-8), securing a berth in the "A Flight" championship series. The "B Flight" playoffs saw \#5 seed Alaskan Bullworms hold serve against \#6 seed Slap a Pitch (14-5), but then fall to \#4 seed Hit \& Run in the semis (9-6). With the win, Hit \& Run punched their ticket to the "B Flight" title series.

## National Conference

The National Conference was tightly contested at the top, but Wu Tang Forever (6-2) took the top seed over Hattrick's Sports Bar and Grill (6-2) on the basis of seasonal runs allowed, as the team had split their regular season encounters. JT Bankers Saloon \& Eatery (5-3) grabbed the third and final spot in the "A Flight" playoffs. Masterbatters (4-3-1) took pole position in the "B Flight" playoffs, while Van Fossen's Vikings (3-4-1) and Team Hunt (2-6) rounded out the field. I'd Hit That (0-7-1) suffered through a lackluster summer, but would return in the fall. Wu Tang Forever's offense was catalyzed by the bats of Ken Goodwin (. 680 AVG, 1.080 SLG, 11 R, 5 2B, 10 RBI), Bryan Peterman (. 636 AVG, 864 SLG, 15 R, 5 2B), John Erb (. 500 AVG, 1.091 SLG, 3 HR, 12 RBI), and female eddie Jamie Richards (. 389 AVG, .444 SLG, 6 R). Meanwhile, Hattrick's Sports Bar and Grill saw big numbers from Dave Dickerson (. 750 AVG, 2.063 SLG, 12 R, 6 HR, 16 RBI) in only 5 games, and teammates Abe Brooks (. 656 AVG, .875 SLG, 15 R, 5 2B), Julian Manes (. 650 AVG, . 696 OBP, 1.100 SLG, 4 3B, 9 RBI ), and male eddie Larry Kirschner (. 563 AVG, 625 SLG, 9 R, 16 RBI ) added lineup depth. Tom DeFrancesco (. 636 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 13 R, 4 HR , 15 RBI ) led the attack of JT Bankers Saloon \& Eatery, while Jack Stepnowski (. 600 AVG, .800 SLG, 10 R, 13 RBI) and female eddies Lynn Hand ( .542 AVG, .625 SLG, 5 R) and Karlene Smith (. 381 AVG, . 476 SLG, 3 R) also delivered. Masterbatters put forth a multi-pronged attack in the form of Matt Poust (. 704 AVG, 1.519 SLG, 14 R, 4 2B, 6 HR, 19 RBI, 41 TB), Jaden Newman (. 778 AVG, 1.667 SLG, 4 HR, 13 RBI), Andrew Alexander (. 630 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 3 HR ), Nick Anderson (. 714 AVG, 1.095 SLG), and Jesse Faller (. 550 AVG, 1.200 SLG, $13 \mathrm{R}, 3 \mathrm{HR}, 14 \mathrm{RBI})$. Van Fossen's Vikings showed similar depth, with Anthony Crawford (. 778 AVG, 1.556 SLG, 4 HR, 14 RBI), John Walsh (. 720 AVG, 880 SLG, 10 R, 9 RBI), male eddie Tom Collins (. 633 AVG, .733 SLG, 12 R, 3 2B, 6 RBI), Jake Gladish (. 538 AVG, .962 SLG, 9 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI), and Steph Farrar (. 500 AVG, . 778 SLG, 7 R, 2 3B) all doing some damage. Team Hunt boasted the batting crown winner in Nic Pataki (1.074 SLG, 14 R, 11 RBI), who posted a . 741 AVG, while male eddies Bob Louderback (. 682 AVG, .720 OBP, 1.000 AVG, 3 2B, 2 3B, 9 RBI) and Kevin Ney (. 533 AVG, .833 SLG, 11 R, 3 2B, 2 HR, 12 RBI) and female eddie Teena Hunt ( 450 AVG, .522 OBP, 4 RBI, 3 BB) helped the team secure the final playoff spot. Despite the disappointing season, l'd Hit That saw outstanding effort from

As far as the frequency with which a HR is hit, Jarred Gardner bangs one out in better than 1 out of every 5 times to the plate. Jarred also scores a run at a better than $3 / 4$ clip ( $77 \%$ ). Frank Hackett (retired) remains the all-time batting leader with a 674 lifetime average. The closest active members to Frank are Jarred Gardner (643) and Jim Lelii (638). As far as slugging percentage is concerned, Mike Haberle (retired) is the extra base leader with a whopping 1472 SLG\%. The closest active members to Mike are Jarred Gardner (1438), Brandon Birkhead (1352), and Mike Bitterlich (1330). Matt Schaub has taken over as the base on balls leader, getting a free pass 372 times in his career. Nobody has a better BB average than Mike Sauler who earns a free pass better than 1 in 4 trips to the plate (28\%).

## Coed League Career Milestones

John Razzi (retired) remains the coed leader in games-played $(1,668)$ and at-bats $(4,932)$. John did hold the lead in all -time hits $(2,666)$ until last year when Keith Keppley $(2,667)$ put a nose in front. Keith has also crossed the plate more than any player in coed history ( 2,352 ), has the most doubles (807) and triples $(293)$ along with the most RBIs $(2,167)$. Nobody scores a coed league run at a clip better than retired Mike Chwieroth (64\%). Jarrett Kerns is the closest active run-scorer at 59\% When it comes to coed slugging, Jarred Gardner is king. Jarred has hit more than 500 dingers at a clip of $22 \%$. Axel Alicea is currently active, but has a long way to go (339). Jarred's batting average and slugging percentage are all-time league bests ( $712 / 1617$ respectively). In spite of not being in the league for a few years now, Christen Flaherty (retired) maintains her all-time base on balls lead with 434, but currently active Kris Pulli is only a handful behind at 429 and counting. Rhiannon Keppley and Jennifer Maddox have the keenest eye at the coed league plate. Each earns a walk to 1B at a clip just shy of 1 in 5 .

## 1-Pitch Tournament Titles

When it comes to coed 1-pitch tournament supremacy, Mark Bernacki and Chris Hesdon have garnered the most tourney wins since the fall of 2001. Each has no less than 8 titles. Too many to list have 4 wins each.

Wondering whether the team number and draft order matter? Well, wonder no more. Team \#6 has landed in the winner's circle 9 times. Team \#8 sits just off 6's heels with 8 wins. Inside posts 1, 2, and 4 each have 4 wins while Teams numbered 3,5, 7, and 9 have won 3 times each. Draw your own conclusion.

## Triple Crowns

Any player that reaches a career plateau of 500 or 1,000 career runs, career hits, and career RBIs shall earn a 500 or 1,000 Triple Crown award. Before last year, 51 men's league players had reached the Triple Crown 500 plateau. 7 have reached the Triple Crown 1,000 mark. 61 coed league players have made it to the Triple Crown 500 level while 9 have gotten to the coed Triple Crown 1,000 milestone. In 26 years of SBA existence, 6 league members have managed the incredible feat of acquiring what I call the Double Triple Crown-500 or more RUNS, HITS and RBIs in both the men's and coed leagues. Those seven players are, in order of acquisition, Rob Johnson, Keith Keppley, Steph Garret, Jarred Gardner, Tim O'Shea, Jr., and Warren Grant. Move over fellas and make room for Gene Walczak who made the grade in 2021.

2nd umpire for more information (help) relative to the call. This request is just that, a request. If the umpire you are appealing to is confident his/her call is the correct one, he/she is not obligated to ask the 2nd umpire for help. No umpire shall criticize, seek to reverse or interfere with another umpire's call unless asked to do so by the umpire that made the call. As umpire, a request for an appeal of another umpire's call should fall on deaf ears by anyone other than the umpire that made the call.
What's the rule on overthrows? When does the runner get 1 base and when does the runner get $\mathbf{2}$ bases?
This is probably the most often asked question l've received over the years. The simple answer is the runner always gets 2 bases on an overthrow. The main reason people think a runner gets only 1 base is when the overthrow comes to 1B from an infielder and the runner is then awarded only 2 nd base. In reality, the runner has gotten 2 bases on that overthrow-$-1 B$ and 2B. What confuses people is the fact they aren't aware that for any overthrow the runner is awarded bases from the point of release of the throw, not when the ball goes out of play. If a shortstop fields a ground ball and throws to $1 B$, the batter/runner has not yet reached 1B at the point of release of the throw so the batter/runner is awarded 1B and 2B (2 bases). The same holds true for a throw from the outfield that goes out of play. It doesn't matter where the runner is when the ball goes out of play. It only matters where the runner is when the ball leaves the fielders hand.

## What can I do if my stats are wrong?

If you feel your game stats are off, contact the respective league statistician and request an investigation. If the discrepancy arose from a transcribing error from score sheet to stat program, that's an easy fix. It's not so easy if the discrepancy stems from what's recorded on the score sheet. In fact, it's next to impossible to correct. The problem could indeed be a result of scorekeeper error. It could also arise from a difference in scoring judgment. If you thought you should have been awarded a hit on a particular at-bat, but the scorekeeper felt it was an error or recorded the error in error, a discrepancy will occur. The best line of defense in this particular situation is to be proactive. Once the game is over, ask the scorekeeper if you could look over the game score sheet. Any questionable calls can be addressed right then and there. To expect a scorekeeper to remember what happened in one of your at-bats from a week ago is unrealistic.
I was ejected from a game for throwing my bat. Isn't an umpire required to first issue a warning?
Throwing equipment out of anger or disgust is an automatic ejection from the game. This is not written in our league rules nor will you find it in the ASA rule book. It falls under the heading of 'Unsportsmanlike Conduct' and for safety's sake

In the summer, the American League was paced by The Commission who once again finished in first at 7-1. They managed to score over 100 more runs than they gave up(167-57). Fighting for the second place sport were Hooligans, King's Corner, and Outback, who all finished at 5-3. All three teams scored over 100 runs. This wasn't just Kevin' Roche's season. It was his damn playground. If you were at the field on Thursday nights, all you had to do was pop open a beer and take a seat because you were in for a show. Roche hit .714, smashed 9 homers, and drove in 31 runs. Balls left the yard with Teammate CJ Motts hit . 731 with 6 homers himself. Chris Adam of The Max Challenge and the ageless Frank Staber of King's Corner both hit .714 as well. King's Corner and The Commission met in the summer championship with The Commission coming out on top in two games. Their relentless offense ripped off 20 extra base hits including 7 homers to help win the summer ship. Dirty Dozen was the top dog in the National League for the summer at 6-2. They managed to only give up 83 runs for the season. Tied for second at $5-3$ were the Bush Bumpers and DaVanzo Shift who both scored 102 runs. Hitting was certainly on display as four players all batted at least .800. They were Tom Shields of Bush Bumpers (.840), Terry Keller of Sex Panther(.833), Ben Vitelli of Dirty Dozen(.806), and Eric Foct of Sex Panther(.800). Frank Fusca of Dirty Dozen hit .704 with 6 homers, and 26 RBI. Kevin Hott of Nine Inch Males jacked 7 homers with 18 RBI. Bush Bumpers and Dirty Dozen met up in the finals. Bush Bumpers
brought the bats, p lating 45 runs in two games on their way to the summer title.
The fall season in the American League was truly one filled with parity. The top four teams of King's Corner, Hooligans, The Commission, and Master Blasters all finished at $5-3$, proving that anybody could be beat on any given night. Hooligan's and The Commission brought the offense every week, scoring 157 and 152 runs, respectively. Brandon Birkhead of Hooligans could not get out, hitting . 857 while collecting 24 RBI. Playoffs The playoffs began with the top tier pairings. \#1 seed Wu Tang Forever slaughtered \#4 seed Muckdogs (251), while \#3 seed Custom Cabinetry Finishes overcame \#2 seed Turtles in a close one (12-10), ensuring both victors an "A Flight" championship berth. But the season wasn't over for Muckdogs or Turtles; the former took out \#5 seed Chico's Bail bonds (10-6), while the latter held strong against \#6 seed Dugout Sharks (15-4). With that, the final pairing was set for the "B Flight" finals. For the champs, Bill Stone (. 900 AVG, .917 OBP, 6 R), Ryan Hamilton (. 667 AVG, 1.000 SLG), and Tony Cabot (. 444 AVG, 1.222 SLG, 6 R, 2 HR, 9 RBI) swung the hot playoff bats, while Kyle Rizzi (. 73 AVG, 1.133 SLG, 5 R, 2 HR, 9 RBI), Jason Brown (. 643 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 5 R, 4 HR, 7 RBI), and Jake Feehan (. 625 AVG, 1.188 SLG, $19 \mathrm{R}, 23$ 2B, $2 \mathrm{HR}, 7 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) did their best for the runners-up. Returning to the "A Flight", Wu Tang Forever showed that they were the team to beat, winning Game 1 convincingly (10-1) and the ultimately deciding Game 2 in dramatic fashion, holding Custom Cabinetry Finishes to 3 runs in the bottom of the 7th inning to preserve a 1615 lead and claim the crown. In the postseason, Bryan Peterman (. 875 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 4 R), Tom Koelzer ( 778 AVG, 1.444 SLG, 5 R, 1 HR, 7 RBI), Axel Alicea ( .714 AVG, 2.000 SLG, 3 R, 3 HR, 8 RBI), and Keith Keppley ( .700 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 6 R, 2 3B, 1 HR, 4 RBI ) poured it on for Wu Tang Forever, despite the best efforts of Custom Cabinetry Finishes players Tony Oliver (. 667 AVG, . 889 SLG, 4 R, 5 RBI), Shawn Ortman ( .545 AVG, .1.182 SLG, 3 R, 2 3B, 1 HR, 4 RBI), and Brian Sauers (. 545 AVG, .909 SLG, 3 R, 2 3B, 3 RBI). Congratulations to Muckdogs for earning their franchise's 2nd title (previously summer 2019), and to Wu Tang Forever for the same achievement, in this case a repeat accomplishment!

SUMMER By the start of the summer season on June 9th, league enrollment had swelled from 9 to 13 teams, as compared to the mere 7 teams who participated in the admittedly unusual summer of 2020. Altek Hard Drivers and Warning Track Power did not return this season, but new entrants included We Buy Houses, Booze Hounds, Pitches Be Trippin, Knuckleheads, Mayhem, and The Reserves. The Screwballs and Dugout Sharks changed their names to The Goats and Hitmen, respectively. To accommodate the larger number of teams, American and National Conferences were reestablished. The postseason format also featured an "A Flight" playoffs for the 1st and 2nd finishers in both conferences, while the 3rd, 4th, and 5th place teams would compete for a "B Flight" championship.

American Conference Though a new team to Wednesday Evening Coed, We Buy Houses was in fact a pretty experienced team with plenty of star power, a fact they demonstrated by winning the regular season conference title with a 7-1 record. Two games back were Chico's Bail Bonds (5-3, 83 runs allowed) and Booze Hounds (5-3, 87 runs allowed); Chico's Bail Bonds got the \#2 seed on the basis of seasonal runs allowed, as the two teams had split their regular season meetings. Half a game back, "A Flight" runners-up Custom Cabinetry Finishes were in the mix as always (4-3-1), and the final playoff spot went to Turtles, who put together a rather inconsistent season (2-5-1). Though they missed the playoff cut, Pitches Be Trippin (1-7) did eke out a win in their SBA debut season. Jarrett Kerns (. 750 AVG, 1.393 SLG, 18 R, 8 2B, 17 RBI), Frank Fusca ( .731 AVG, 1, 192 SLG, 15 R, 5 2B, 18 RBI), and Bill Brancato ( .645 AVG, 1.032 SLG, 15 R, 11 RBI) fueled the fire behind the regular season success of We Buy Houses. For Chico's Bail Bonds, Bill Shipe (. 760 AVG, 1.480 SLG, 5 2B, 3 HR) led the conference with 24 RBI, while teammates John Zeits ( .618 AVG, . 629 OBP, 15 R), Kevin Shinkunas (. 682 AVG, . 909 SLG, 14 R, 5 2B, 14 RBI), and male eddie Larry Kirschner (. 630 AVG, . 655 OBP, 9 R, 6 RBI) further bolstered the offense. Booze Hounds got big production from Matt Friend (. 793 AVG, 1.276 SLG, 19 R, 7 2B, 19 RBI) and Justin Gaumer (. 667 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 16 R, 3 HR, 17 RBI), while female eddie Lynn Hand ( .636 AVG, .727 SLG, 7 R) and male eddies Dan Gaumer ( .567 AVG, 12 R, 9 RBI) and Mike Suchanec ( .586 AVG, 9 RBI) also made important contributions. The big story for Custom Cabinetry Finishes was the performance of young stars Brian Dart (. 767 AVG, 1.600 SLG, 19 R, 16 RBI), who led the conference with 7 HR and 48 TB, and Russ Laughlin (. 613 AVG, 1.387 SLG, 16 R, 21 RBI, 43 TB), who also blasted 7 HR. Male eddies Brian Sauers (. 600 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 8 R, 3 3B, 9 RBI) and Dave Buonomo (. 565 AVG, 8 R) showed that they still had it, and female eddie Jess Haug ( .333 AVG, .370 SLG, 5 RBI) also performed well. Despite not winning a lot of games, Turtles managed to have many players with great seasons, including Kyle Rizzi ( 800 AVG, 1.367 SLG, 3 HR, 20 RBI, 41 TB ), conference leader with 23 R and 24 H , batting title winner Kevin Roche (. 818 AVG, 1.727 SLG, 12 R, 6 HR, 19 RBI), Jason Brown ( .750 AVG, 1.850 SLG, 9 R, 6 HR, 14 RBI), Jay Pane (. 767 AVG, 1.133 SLG, 12 R, 9 RBI), and Tom Moyer (. 630 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 11 R, 3 HR, 14 RBI). Female eddies Caitlyn Rinker ( .353 AVG, .412 SLG), Erin Bintner ( .353 AVG, .389 OBP), and Lauren Wood ( 300 AVG, .350 SLG, 6 R) made this lineup deep. Pitches Be Trippin showed some promise, most of all female eddies Mikayla Gallagher (. 333 AVG, . 429 OBP, 6 R, 4 BB ) and Taylor Gallagher ( .300 AVG, .350 SLG, 5 RBI), who really shone on defense. The playoffs began with \#1 seed We Buy Houses knocking off \#2 seed Chico's Bail Bonds in a close affair (8-5) to claim a spot in the "A Flight" finals. Meanwhile, the always dangerous Turtles, as the \#5 seed, unseated \#4 seed Custom Cabinetry Finishes in an exciting game (10-9). Rain postponed Turtles' semifinal game to the next week, so the momentum was lost, and \#3 seed Booze Hounds cruised to the "B Flight" championship series with a 16-11 win.

National Conference Powerhouse Wu Tang Forever didn't miss a beat and continued their winning ways (8-0), averaging 20 runs per game while allowing only 25 all season. Knuckleheads (6-2) simply tried to keep the pace, as did "B

Flight" defending champion Muckdogs (5-3) and The Goats (4-4), who improved on their spring season performance by 4 games. A head-to-head victory gave Mayhem (2-6) the nod for the final playoff spot over Hitmen (2-6). The Reserves ( $0-$ 8) couldn't gain any traction in this conference. Wu Tang Forever got big numbers from Tom Koelzer (. 676 AVG, 21 R), who led the conference with 1.353 SLG, 23 H, 5 HR, 27 RBI, and 46 TB, Jonn Poore (. 826 OBP, 1.182 SLG, 14 R, 17 RBI), batting crown winner with .818 AVG, Chris Hackney (. 636 AVG, .818 SLG, 22 R), and Axel Alicea ( .500 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 11 R, 5 2B, 3 HR, 19 RBI). Female eddie Katie O'Toole ( .708 AVG, .875 SLG, 16 R, $42 \mathrm{~B}, 10 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) was on fire, and Greta Sheridan ( .545 AVG, .636 SLG, 5 R, 7 RBI) and Jackie Heim ( .476 AVG, .619 SLG, 9 R, 7 RBI) also posted strong efforts. A number of eddies stepped up big for Knuckleheads, including male eddies Bobby Hartzell (. 652 AVG, .870 SLG, 13 R, 2 3B, 11 RBI), Dan Vescovi (. 600 AVG, . 800 SLG, 9 R, 2 3B, 8 RBI), John Schofield (. 579 AVG, .632 SLG, 7 R, 9 RBI), and female eddie Stephanie Farrar (. 500 AVG, .750 SLG, 11 R, 1 HR, 5 RBI), while Gene Schwendeman (. 684 AVG, 1.211 SLG, 13 R), conference leader with 5 3B, and Jaden Newman (. 609 AVG, 1.087 SLG, 12 R, 3 3B) also delivered. Muckdogs were lifted by the offense of Mike Zahradnick (.810 AVG, 1.286 SLG, 10 R, 15 RBI) and male eddie John Connors (. 619 AVG, 1.143 SLG, 13 R, 13 RBI ), who shared the conference lead with 7 2B, and male eddies Bill Stone ( .737 AVG, .808 OBP, 1.105 SLG, 17 R, 3 2B, 2 3B, 7 BB), Eric Shade ( .524 AVG, .810 SLG, 9 R, 1 HR, 11 RBI), and female eddie Lauren Hess (. 474 AVG, .545 OBP, 6 R, 7 RBI ) also made a difference. The playoffs began with a blowout win for \#1 seed Wu Tang Forever over \#2 seed Knuckleheads (17-1), advancing the defending champs to another "A Flight" final series. Over at Hatfield, \#5 seed Mayhem narrowly toppled \#4 seed The Goats (6-5), but met their match in the semifinals against the \#3 seed Muckdogs (16-10), who earned the right to defend their championship in the "B Flight" title series with the win.
"A Flight" and "B Flight" Championships The "A Flight" finals saw the American Conference winners We Buy Houses square off against Wu Tang Forever from the National Conference. Though the series was competitive, it still resulted in a two-game sweep for the inexorable Wu Tang Forever squad (22-14, 12-4). Major contributors to the champs' success were Axel Alicea (. 889 AVG, 1.889 SLG, 4 R, 3 HR, 14 RBI), Keith Keppley (. 875 AVG, 1.250 SLG, 3 R, 3 2B), Mike Koelzer (. 833 AVG, 2.167 SLG, 6 R, 2 HR, 8 RBI), Ryan Goodman (. 727 AVG, 1.364 SLG, 6 R, 2 HR, 7 RBI), and Tom Koelzer (. 700 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 6 R, 3 2B, 3 RBI). Jarrett Kerns ( 857 AVG, .889 OBP, 1.857 SLG, 5 R, 2 HR, 7 RBI) put up a good fight for the runners-up We Buy Houses. Representing the National Conference, the Muckdogs found themselves paired against the Booze Hounds from American Conference. This series was an exciting one, but it also ended in a twogame sweep (16-15, 11-7) with the Muckdogs coming out on top. The Muckdogs' playoff run was propelled by male eddies Eric Shade (. 778 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 2 R, 1 3B) and Bill Stone ( .750 AVG, 1.125 SLG, 4 R, 1 3B, 2 RBI), as well as Tony Cabot (. 700 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 3 R, 1 HR, 6 RBI), Greg Hess (. 667 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 5 R, 6 RBI), and Mike Zahradnick (. 625 AVG, 1.750 SLG, 6 R, 8 RBI). Superhuman playoff efforts from Joseph Gaumer (. 833 AVG, . 846 OBP, 1.917 SLG, 10 R, 4 HR, 8 RBI ) and solid help from Matt Friend (. 667 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 4 R, 1 HR, 10 RBI) weren't quite enough for the Booze Hounds. It was a summer for repeats, as both Wu Tang Forever and Muckdogs duplicated their spring accomplishment in winning "A Flight" and "B Flight" titles, respectively. Congratulations to both teams!

FALL After a week 1 complete rainout, the fall season got underway on September 8th, after which the weather was quite cooperative, allowing the final games to be played on November 3rd, before the onset of the holidays. We Buy Houses, Pitches Be Trippin, and Hitmen skipped the fall season, but Wehrung's Lumber (largely the Warning Track Power team from the spring season) and Jive Turkeys entered the fray, bringing the league enrollment to an even 12 teams. The American/National Conference and playoff format was retained for the fall season with some realignment of their composition.

American Conference Wu Tang Forever began the season with some talk of a 33-0 year beginning to surface around their team. They marched through the regular season, defeating nearly all opponents by 10 to 30 run margins (the lone exception was a $9-4$ win against Chico's Bail Bonds), impressively plating 181 runs while allowing only 35 and finishing with another perfect $8-0$ record; a 30-0 mark thus far in 2021. They would meet Turtles (6-2), always a dangerous team, in the "A Flight" semifinals. Chico's Bail Bonds posted a $5-3$ record to grab the top seed for the "B Flight" playoffs, followed by Wehrung's Lumber (3-5), and The Goats (1-7). The Reserves replicated their summer performance (0-8) and saw an early end to their softball year. Tom Koelzer ( .765 AVG, 1.382 SLG, 6 HR, 47 TB) had a monster season for Wu Tang Forever, leading the conference with 22 R, 26 H , and 31 RBI, and fall season addition Jarrett Kerns (. 808 AVG, 1.538 SLG, 20 R, 16 BI, 40 TB) led with 7 2B and 3 3B. Axel Alicea (. 548 AVG, 1.290 SLG, 16 R, 7 HR, 21 RBI, 40 TB), Jonn Poore (. 607 AVG, 1.250 SLG, 14 R, 4 HR, 9 RBI), Mike Koelzer (. 591 AVG, 1.591 SLG, 11 R, 6 HR, 22 RBI), female eddie Krysta Wellington (. 556 AVG, .667 SLG, 12 R, 3 2B, 6 RBI), and male eddies Ron Pulli (. 688 AVG, .813 SLG, 6 R) and Tom Koelzer, Sr. (. 538 AVG, .477 SLG, 11 R, 8 RBI) provided this team with an embarrasment of riches. Meanwhile, Turtles had picked up Dave Dickerson (.815 OBP, 1.500 SLG, 15 R, 4 HR, 18 RBI), who garnered a batting crown with .833 AVG. Teammates Frank Fusca (. 720 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 3 3B, 23 RBI), Kyle Rizzi (. 640 AVG, 1.280 SLG, 15 R, 6 2B), Jay Pane (. 654 AVG, 1.038 SLG, 15 R), Kevin Roche (. 619 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 9 R, 4 HR, 14 RBI), and female eddies Kaelyn Motts (. 385 AVG, .500 SLG, 5 R, 1 HR, 6 RBI) and Lauren Wood ( .389 AVG, .421 OBP, 7 R) added some clout. will be called each and every time a player performs that act. Having the bat accidently slip out of your hands is quite different and an umpire would likely issue a warning in that case. Under no circumstances is an umpire 'required' to issue a warning before issuing an ejection. Warnings are issued by the umpire strictly as a courtesy.
My child wants to play softball with me this year. What are the league age requirements?
Playing softball with your son and/or daughter is so cool. I wish I had that opportunity to experience that when I was playing. Minors under the age of 18, but older than 15 are eligible to play softball in Softball America with a completed and signed parental consent form. 14 year-olds are eligible if they will be turning 15 at any point in the calendar year. Download the form at the link here... Parental Consent Form. The form must be signed and remitted to the league office, game umpire, or game scorekeeper BEFORE the minor can take the field.

## My company wants to sponsor our team, but is concerned with liability. Are sponsors covered?

Any and all league sponsors are automatically covered under the league $\$ 2$ million liability policy. There is no league sponsor fee or additional charge whatsoever. Any financial arrangements and considerations are made between the sponsor and the team.

## Why do some teams in the weekly standings have asterisks next to their names?

When a team is involved in a forfeit, an asterisk is placed next to the team name to remind the league statistician to adjust the Runs Given Up total at the end of the season. The runs-against total for teams involved in forfeits is to be adjusted upward to compensate for the automatic 7-0 score awarded to forfeited games. League statisticians will take the average of all non-forfeited games and assign that average to each forfeited game. As an example, let's say a 5-3 team has a runs -against total of 60 . In 2 of their games they were involved in a forfeit. The runs-against total of 60 is to be divided by the 6 non-forfeited games for an actual average of 10 runs-against per game. The average of 10 runs-against per game is assigned to each forfeited game and the adjusted runs-against total shall become 80 . This is important in determining tiebreaks.
I asked to have a game moved to another time slot, but the league turned me down. Why can't the league be more flexible with scheduling?
As much as l'd like to help teams with their scheduling issues, my hands are really tied on this. Changing scheduled games to accommodate a team's personal agenda has not and never will be permitted. If you stop and think about the ramifications of what's being asked, you would come to realize it's tantamount to scheduling suicide. If I move things around for one team, it has an affect on many other teams. Dozens of league members would have to change their plans. Even if I could get that to work, the entire league would see it happening and expect me to extend to them the same scheduling liberties for their own personal issues. Their argument would be that I did it for another team so I have to do it for their team and they would have a legitimate case. Games would be moving around each and every week. For the greater good of the league, I can't allow that to happen. Any and all scheduling conflicts and issue must be addressed BEFORE the schedule is officially posted. Once posted, the schedule will not change save for postponements and/or scheduling mishaps on my part.

Speaking of Mr. Poore, he did manage to do something that no one in league history has every done. He hit 5 legit, over- the-fence dingers in one game. Think about that. It's not often a player gets to the plate 5 times in a 7 -inning game let alone hit one out in each of their 5 at-bats. Talk about being in the zone? There is only one word to describe that feat... AWESOME!

## Testosterone

When a men's league team has what they think is an all-time great season, they want to know how they stack up to the teams of yesteryear. I can appreciate that. Here is a reprint of an article I wrote for the 2016 SBA Year in Review. It should give you a good idea of who had the biggest 'appendage' through the years. After all, guys wouldn't be guys without a pissing contest now and again.

Which weeknight men's team was the most prolific since the start of the league 26 years ago? Which had the most runs scored, the most HRs, the highest team batting average and slugging percentage in a single season? Let's take a peek.
(REPRINT) The 2016 Tuesday Men's Summer Irish Car Bombs hit 23 HRs and slugged 941, but didn't match up anywhere else. The Doylestown Gold Exchange from Tuesday Men's Spring 2014 hit 22 HRs. Then I came across the Vertex Pest squad from the Thursday Men's fall of 2013. They had a team batting average of 596 and 185 runs scored. That team could fill the score sheet. Mike's Bar and Grill from the Tuesday Men's summer of 2011 hit a whopping 32 HRs, slugged 1082, but somehow didn't score the runs (167). Bones Grille from the Tuesday Men's fall season of 2009 batted 611, hit 23 HRs and scored 184 runs. All well and good to this point. Everything was looking evenly matched until I came across the 99 Restaurant team from the spring season of 2009. 53 HRs in a single season with a slugging \% of 1217. As crazy as this may sound, they didn't score the most runs (175). There had to be an awful lot of solo shots that season. Then I came across the ProTech Roofing squad from Thursday Men's fall 2003. They batted 613 and slugged 1240 as a team. They blasted 35 HRs over the course of only 7 games. I can't remember why there were only 7 games that season, but it was the case for the entire Thursday Men's league. It probably had something to do with the weather and ball field permits. Anyway, extend it out to 8 games and you have a total of 182 runs scored. In the same league/season/ year, Surplus Asset Sales batted 604 and slugged 1115 with 31 HRs. Remember, this was a 7 -game season. Extended over 8 games and the runs-scored total comes to 190. However, when you talk about scoring runs, nobody matched County Line Fence's 210 in the Tuesday Men's spring of 2003. That team batted 613 and slugged 1006 with 25 4baggers. Nail or Never hit 31 HRs and slugged 1078 in the fall of 2001. In the fall of 2000, J\&J Deck batting 638 and slugged 1185. Also in the fall of 2000, Richboro Pub batted 611 and scored 186 runs. In the spring of 99, The Bull Frog scored 192 runs. The Village Tavern teams of 1998 were nothing to sneeze at, twice scoring over 200 runs (207, 205) and batting 640 in the Thursday Men's fall league. Their 1145 slugging and 28 HRs were not too shabby.

So, which is the most powerful weeknight men's team of all time? That depends on who you talk to. I guess we can debate it until the cows come home. 53 HRs in a single season. That's quite impressive. 210 runs scored in a single season. Pretty damn good. A 640 team batting average. Wow!

Since 2016, only a handful of teams had what might be considered a prolific season. The 2018 Spring Thursday Men's Mayhem scored 161 runs off 24 HRs, batting 538. The 2018 Fall Thursday Men's Jamison Pour House scored 162 off 22 HRs and batted 572. The 2021 Philly Junk squad scored 205 runs on 314 -baggers while batting an impressive 631. The 2021 Spring Thursday Men's The Commission scored 169, banged out an eye-popping 46 HRs and batted 572. The 2021 Fall Thursday Men's Hooligan's scored 157, hammered 22 HRs, and batted 557 . These are all really good teams that had very prolific seasons, but 53 HRs, 210 runs scored and 640 team batting is where the bar is currently set.

National Conference Custom Cabinetry Finishes (7-1), an embodiment of consistent excellence, easily outpaced the competition in the National Conference, their lone loss coming at the hand of Turtles from the American Conference early in the season. 2nd place in the conference was decided by a tiebreak, with Knuckleheads (4-4) getting the nod, having beaten both Booze Hounds (4-4) and Muckdogs (4-4). Booze Hounds placed 3rd on the merit of having defeated Muckdogs. The final playoff spot went to Mayhem (3-5), winners of their encounter with Jive Turkeys (3-5), who unfortunately were done for the year despite a good showing. For Custom Cabinetry Finishes, Mike Downey (.769 AVG, 1.348 SLG, $17 \mathrm{R}, 13 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) had a standout season, leading the conference with . 778 OBP and tying for the lead with 4 HR, while Mike Marnoch (. 600 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 11 R, 4 BB), Brian Dart (. 538 AVG, .885 SLG, 10 R, 11 RBI), Russ Laughlin ( 611 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 10 R), and female eddies Jess Haug (. 391 AVG, .478 SLG, 6 R, 2 2B) and Maddi Bieber (. 318 AVG, . 360 OBP, $6 \mathrm{R}, 8 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) provided the lineup depth so important to the team's continued success. Knuckleheads can credit their "A Flight" qualification to the performances of Jesse Faller (. 633 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 18 R, 4 HR, 14 RBI), Jaden Newman (. 720 AVG, 1.160 SLG, 12 R, 13 RBI ), and male eddies Dan Vescovi (. 593 AVG, .815 SLG, 13 RBI ) and Bobby

Hartzell (. 593 AVG, 13 R, 11 RBI). Justin Gaumer (. 676 AVG, 1.176 SLG, 16 R, 20 RBI), conference leader with 23 H, 4 HR, and 40 TB, Matt King (. 700 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 15 R, 6 2B, 14 RBI), Chris Adams (. 581 AVG, 1.241 SLG, 15 RBI), leader with 18 R and 4 HR , Matt Friend (. 789 AVG, . 800 OBP, 1.263 SLG, 10 R , 10 RBI ), leader with 7 2B, male eddie Brian Chester (. 462 AVG, .654 SLG, 11 R, 2 3B, 11 RBI), and female eddie Lynn Hand ( .517 AVG, .531 OBP, 8 R, 14 RBI) made the Booze Hounds a potent offensive threat on any given night. The batting title went to male eddie John Connors ( 1.348 SLG, 14 R, 4 2B, 3 HR) of Muckdogs, who posted a .783 AVG and also led the conference with 22 RBI. Teammates Tony Cabot (. 591 AVG, . 615 OBP, 1.045 SLG, 15 R), conference leader with 4 3B, male eddies Bill Stone (. 571 AVG, . 654 OBP, . 810 SLG, 13 R, 3 2B, 5 BB) and Eric Shade (. 600 AVG, .700 SLG, 8 RBI), and female eddie Brielle Eve (. 357 AVG, .393 SLG, 7 R) also kept the team very competitive. Mayhem's season was highlighted by the campaigns of Tom Hayes (. 654 AVG, . 679 OBP, 1.077 SLG, 9 R, 21 RBI), Ben Gillis (. 680 AVG, .714 OBP, 1.040 SLG, 15 R, 4 2B), Zach Lyall (. 556 AVG, 1.222 SLG, 16 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI, 6 BB), and female eddie Michelle Dulany (. 467 AVG, .556 OBP, 3 BB); as a team, Mayhem easily took the most BB on the season ( 39 BB ). A trio of players led Jive Turkeys to a 3-win SBA debut; namely, Kyle Feasby (. 708 AVG, 1.167 SLG, 14 R, 5 2B, 12 RBI), Andrew Fantaskey (. 667 AVG, 1.381 SLG, 16 RBI), conference leader with 4 HR, and Nick Amadino (. 640 AVG, 1.160 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B, 3 HR, 17 RBI). The "A Flight" playoffs featured a rather intense game, with \#1 seed Custom Cabinetry Finishes eking out a 21-20 win over \#2 seed Knuckleheads, and earning the right to face off against American Conference winner Wu Tang Forever for the title in a repeat matchup from the spring season. \#4 seed Muckdogs kept their "three-peat" hopes alive with an 18-5 quarterfinals win against \#5 seed Mayhem, but saw them dashed by a brazen \#3 seed Booze Hounds team in the semis (31-21). With that, Booze Hounds earned their berth in the "B Flight" championship series.
"A Flight" and "B Flight" Championships On the brink of an historic accomplishment, Wu Tang Forever was brimming with confidence as they squared off against Custom Cabinetry Finishes for the "A Flight" crown. Indeed, they executed a rather convincing two-game sweep (19-10, 25-4) to complete their quest for 3 top tier titles in 2021 with a perfect 33-0 record. Substantial contributors to Wu Tang Forever's playoff success were Jimmy Craig (. 714 AVG, .750 OBP, 4 R, 4 RBI), Krysta Wellington (. 714 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 5 R, 2 RBI), and Tom Koelzer (. 700 AVG, 2.000 SLG, 6 R, 2 2B, 3 HR, 14 RBI). Though Custom Cabinetry Finishes ultimately fell short, Mike Downey (. 900 AVG, 2.100 SLG, 7 R, 3 2B, 3 HR, 10 RBI ) elevated his level of offense during the playoffs. The fall "B Flight" title series was the only one in the Wednesday Evening Coed league to go the full three games. It began with Booze Hounds getting the jump on Chico's Bail Bonds in Game 1 (16-9). Chico's Bail Bonds fought back to take Game 2 (14-9), but Booze Hounds fully showed their offense's capability to easily take Game 3 (21-6). For the champs, Justin Gaumer was unstoppable (. 944 AVG, 1.611 SLG, 16 R, 4 2B, 2 HR, 19 RBI), and Chris Adams (. 833 AVG, 1.667 SLG, 12 R, 6 2B, 3 HR, 22 RBI), male eddie Brian Chester ( .733 AVG, .778 OBP, 16 R, 6 RBI, 3 BB), and Matt Friend (. 722 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 4 R, 3 2B, 12 RBI) compounded the damage. The runners-up saw great efforts from Greg Reilly (. 714 AVG, .929 SLG, 6 R, 3 2B), Kyle Gallagher (. 636 AVG, 1.182 SLG, 5 R, 2 HR, 7 RBI), and John Zeits (. 600 AVG, . 667 SLG, 6 R). Congratulations to Booze Hounds for their first SBA title - an exciting team with an explosive offense. And hats off to Wu Tang Forever for extending their Wednesday Evening Coed title streak to 4, earning 3 "A Flight" crowns in 2021, and with a perfect 33-0 record no less!
