Men's League Career Milestones

The only constant in life is change. The same can be applied to baseball/softball records.

Rich Beck, Matt Schaub, and John Kiefer are at the top of the men's league games-played list with John Kiefer holding a slight edge at 1,035. It won't be long before Matt Schaub



passes everyone to become the all-time leader in men's league at-bats and games played. Matt also has the most career runs scored with 1,905, the most 2-baggers (454) and 3-baggers (147). Brian

Penecale (retired) maintains his grasp on all-time base hits, singles, home runs and RBIs, but without coming out of retirement that will be short-lived. Kevin Roche has replaced Bobby Argeros as the all-time run scoring percentage leader

Players of the Year

Regular & Post-Season Standouts

Matt Schaub and Kevin Hott will share men's league Player of the Year honors for 2022. This will be Matt's 4th POTY (2013, 2015, 2016) and Kevin's 2nd title (2018). Matt's numbers were downright gaudy— batting 731 and slugging 1538 for the year. He knocked in a run almost 3/4 of the time and scored a run almost 2/3 of the time. Kevin batted 703 and slugged a league leading 1781. Brandon Birkhead finished 3rd in the offensive point totals batting 648 and slugging 1573. Pat Kelley and Jay Cowan rounded out the top 5.

Coed league Player of the Year honors goes to Brandon Birkhead who batted 801 and set a new yearly slugging record of 2072. His 111 RBI% meant he batted in a run at a clip better than an RBI per trip to the plate. 667. Pat Kelley finished a distant 2nd behind Birky, but his numbers were impressive nonetheless. Pat batted 768 and slugged 1747. Tom Koelzer, Jr., Jarrett Kerns, and Keith Keppley completed the top 5.

Tess Frelich will take her first-ever women's POTY award. Tess was not only a force with the bat in 2022, but she was

Wackers Claim Three Championships. Hagan's Heroes Earn A Division Crown. I'd Hit That and Hit & Run Win B Division Titles.

The Sunday Afternoon Coed league of Softball America began in 2022 with many of the champions from 2021 returning with the goal of adding new titles to their belts, including Hagan's Heroes, Wu Tang Forever, Wackers, JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery, and Hit & Run. The league retained the balanced American/National League format that was adopted in Summer 2021 wherein the top two teams from each league would vie for an A-flight finals berth against the top team from the other league. Likewise, the 3rd through 5th place teams would battle it out for a spot in the B-flight finals against the advancing team from the other league.

SPRING After a one-week delay to the planned season start, 14 teams took the field on April 10th, representing a decrease in enrollment compared to Spring 2021 (20 teams), but on par with the 14 teams that participated in Fall 2021.

American League In the American League, the respective Summer 2021 and Fall 2021 champs, Wu Tang Forever and Wackers, both posted a 7-1 regular season record. Wu Tang Forever received the nod for the #1 seed based on head-to-head record, but both teams would proceed to the A -flight playoff bracket. I'd Hit That locked up the #3 seed with a 4-4 record, while the #4 seed went to Slap A Pitch (3-4-1, 114 RGU) over Team EnVi (3-4-1, 147 RGU) on the basis of seasonal runs-against. Team Hunt (2-6) and Gwynedd Manufacturing (0-8) came up short of a playoff berth, but would return for the summer season. The depth of Wu Tang Forever's roster was key to their success, as they enjoyed strong contributions from John Erb (.800 AVG, 1.100 SLG, 16 R, 13 RBI), who led the league with 24 H, Ken Goodman (.710 AVG, .968 SLG, 17 R, 12 RBI), Chris Hackney (.667 AVG, .900 SLG, 18 R, 13 RBI), male eddies Tom Egitto (.680 AVG, .800 SLG, 13 R, 3 2B, 12 RBI) and Rich Stead (.586 AVG, .690 SLG, 12 R, 10 RBI), and female eddies Chelsea Detweiler (.531 AVG, .688 SLG, 12 R, 3 2B, 9 RBI), Jamie Richards (.476 AVG, .524 SLG, 9 R), and Gina Tyson (.500 AVG, 8 R). John Poore (.615 AVG, 1.192 SLG, 11 R, 19 RBI) led the league with 5 HR, and Wu Tang Forever also got an additional 4 HR, 11 R, and 19 RBI in 4 games from Brandon Birkhead. Wackers also boasted an impressive roster, with Ty Allen (1.385 SLG, 7 2B, 17 RBI) leading the league with 21 R, .846 AVG, and 36 TB. Robert Akers (.739 AVG, 1.478 SLG, 20 R, 8 2B, 16 RBI, 34 TB) posted similar numbers, and Bill Brancato (.800 AVG, 1.280 SLG, 16 R, 24 RBI), Alex Freeman (.800 AVG, 1.450 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 15 RBI), Brandon Roman (.778 AVG, 1.056 SLG, 12 R), and Jarrett Kerns (.640 AVG, 1.040 SLG, 16 R, 4 3B, 13 RBI) also moved the needle. Female eddies Lissa Tercha (.682 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 7 R, 3 2B, 2 3B, 14 RBI) and Molly Rice (.545 AVG, 7 R) and male eddie Carman Brancato (.700 AVG, .900 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 12 RBI) rounded out the Wackers' attack. I'd Hit That rode the efforts of Gary Ehly (.679 AVG, .964 SLG, 15 R, 11 RBI), Matt Jacobsen (.750 AVG, .958 SLG, 10 R, 10 RBI), male eddie Roger Sternfeld (.565 AVG, .630 OBP, 7 R, 7 RBI, 4 BB) and female eddie Holly Gleisberg (.524 AVG, 6 R). Slap A Pitch hung tight with Harrison Miller (.714 AVG, 1.095 SLG, 9 R, 3 3B), Kevin Riffel (.667 AVG, .833 SLG, 16 R), Matt Coen (.625 AVG, .917

Connie Georgiadis, the rule changes below are being considered.

I realize it might put a strain on some coed teams, but to make the coed leagues more coed like, there is a pretty good chance eddie requirements will move from the COVID 4-3-2 requirements to the pre-COVID requirements of 4-4-3 (4 eddies in the line-up, 4 eddies in the field of which 3 of the eddies in the field must be female).

A new rule known as the Re-establish Rule is also being considered for 2023. The Re-establish Rule would be in the name of safety and would allow for a base runner on either first or third base to petition the umpire for permission to 're-establish the base', meaning they stand in foul territory prior to and while the pitch is thrown so as to avoid being hit by a line drive while on the bag. The runner MUST retouch the base before running to the next base. While it might be tactical disadvantage to the runner, it would certainly be a safety advantage.

In the name of better competition, a change to the all-star cap for the men's league is in the works. Whether it be a reduction in the number of all-stars allowed per team, a cap on the quality of all-stars per team, an increase or decrease in the cut-off to become an all-star, or it simply stays as it was in 2022, this will be determined in the weeks ahead.

As League Director, my job is to keep the league running smoothly, maintain fairness across the board, and make the game as much fun as it can be for as many league members as possible. One of the biggest league killjoys are teams that become so far superior from a talent standpoint that competition becomes lopsided. Monster squads may be fun for those on the team, but not for the teams that have to compete against them. This has to go down as the number one issue among league members. When a team gets too strong it eliminates the opposing teams' ability to compete. When a team loses the ability to compete, the fun gets sucked right out of the game. I don't know if you've noticed, but time and again when weak teams have to face a monster squad, they would rather pull the plug and forfeit instead of facing inevitable embarrassment. Whenever I try and govern the balance of power, players on the monster squads get all hot and bothered as if I'm going after them personally. I am not going after anyone or any team personally. I am merely looking at the big picture and trying to make things better, not only for the weaker teams, but for the stronger teams. After all, isn't it about having fun in a competitive environment? I don't know about you, but the last thing I would want is to be a player on the receiving end of a forfeit. Unbalanced competition is a breeding ground for forfeits.

A new rule addition in the coed leagues will require the on-deck batter to be visible to the opposing team at all times. This will enable the defense to see at a glance if an eddie or non-eddie batter is up next which will help the defense strategize as to how they want to deal with the current batter.

The Wednesday Evening Men's league was started in the Summer of 2022. It's a fun league with nothing but recreational teams. The competition is relatively laid back. I am determined to keep it that way. For 2023, any team returning to or considering entry into the Wednesday Men's league will not be able to play more than 5 all-stars at any given time. As it stands now, all teams have 2 or less all-stars save for Tap Daddy's who carried 6 in the fall of 2022. They can return with all 6 on their roster, but beginning in the spring of 2023 teams can play only 5 at any given time. A list of all-stars for the 2023 will be published well before the 2023 season commences. I will also reach out to all Wednesday Men's managers.

League umpires Andrew Ruhf and Curt Hensman have made great strides in the advancement of their umpiring careers. Andrew has been an accredited ASA umpire for quite a few decades. This past year he was named ASA District 15 Commissioner, replacing longtime stalwart Jeff Sell. Curt is working on his 2nd decade of umpiring ASA softball and he was recently named ASA District 15 Deputy Commissioner. I am honored to have these guy on board.

Championship shirts for all 2022 winning teams will be delivered to the winning managers at some point after the 2023 season begins. Curt Hensman, Cutting Edge Sports Apparel (CSA) will be handling the champ shirt production and delivery. Curt will also be conducting a coed league manager meeting this year at some point before the season begins. When the time and place is determined, announcements will be made on the SBA website, Facebook, and Twitter. Curt, along with other league umpires will be happy to answer any and all coed manager questions with regard to new rules as well as existing rules. There really isn't a need for a men's manager meeting as men's league rules are quite straight forward and a lot easier to understand.

One-pitch tournaments are always great events. This year we will attempt to cover all the 1-pitch tournament bases with 2 draft coed affairs on Memorial and Labor Day Sundays. A Men's Fall Classic 1-pitch event where full teams are entered with roster restrictions is slated for October. We will attempt to run an all-eddie 1-pitch draft tournament one last time. This tourney is slated for the middle of July. If we can't make it happen, it will be forever dropped from consideration. As long as league members continue to respect the game and the ball field grounds, I have absolutely no problem organizing and running these events.

Plan your softball year in advance armed with the knowledge that league games will NOT be played on Easter Sunday, Memorial Day and Labor Day Sundays and Mondays. Games in 2023 will also NOT be played on Tuesday, July 4th. Games WILL be played on Mother's and Father's Day Sundays as well as Halloween Tuesday. However, and I make no promises, if the Tuesday schedule allows, we may only play the 9:00 and 10:15 games in an attempt to accommodate the trick-or-treaters.

The scheduling format for the Sunday Men's league will stay pretty much the same as in years past with 5 separate divisions of play. Much like last year, single leagues such as Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday Men's along will run as one division. Schedules in leagues that have a wide disparity of talent from top to bottom much like the Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Friday Coed leagues will either be run in 2 divisions (A and B) or be divided into 2 equal leagues

Though they didn't see the postseason, Team Hunt witnessed strong efforts from male eddie Kevin Ney (.500 AVG, .500 OBP, 8 R), who led the league with 6 BB, and Mark Sudell (.652 AVG, .913 SLG, 10 R, 10 RBI). Gwynedd Manufacturing saw promise in the performances of Caleb Weldon (.882 AVG, 1.353 SLG), who was shy of the required 21 AB to qualify for the batting crown, and Hunter DiDomizio (.750 AVG, 1.313 SLG, 8 R). In the A-flight playoffs, #2 seed Wackers toppled #1 seed Wu Tang Forever (14-10), to secure a berth in the A-flight championship series. As further indication of how closely matched these two teams were this season, the B-flight playoffs saw #4 seed Slap A Pitch barely hold off #5 seed Team EnVi (12-11). That earned Slap a Pitch a semifinals berth, but there they fell to #3 seed I'd Hit That (16-10), who thus advanced to the B-flight title series.

National League Hoping to repeat their Spring 2021 title-winning performance, Hagan's Heroes stormed the National League, finishing with a perfect 8-0 record. A logiam for the subsequent playoff seeds was resolved by consideration of seasonal runs-against. The No Shows (5-3, 77 RGU) earned the #2 seed and a spot in the A-flight playoff bracket. Hit & Run (3-5), the Summer 2021 B-flight champions squeaked into the playoffs, while JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery (2-6) and Breaking Bat (1-7) were on the outside looking in. Keith Keppley had an unreal season at the plate for Hagan's Heroes, leading the league with .893 AVG, .867 OBP, 1.893 SLG, 20 R, 25 H, 5 3B, 26 RBI, and 53 TB - and he finished second in the league with 5 HR. Hogan's Heroes was no one-man show though; male eddie and perennial talent Ron Pulli (.786 AVG, 1.071 SLG, 4 2B, 16 R, 21 RBI), Jay Pane (.720 AVG, 1.040 SLG, 15 R, 24 RBI), Chase Luxton (.700 AVG, .933 SLG, 17 R, 12 RBI), Adam Lightkep (.633 AVG, .900 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 13 RBI), and female eddies Kaelynn Motts (.520 AVG, 7 R, 9 RBI) and Brittany Ullman (.433 AVG, .600 SLG, 13 R, 10 RBI) kept the baserunners moving, while Rhiannon Keppley (.400 AVG, .679 OBP, 11 R) and Kris Pulli (.222 AVG, .692 OBP, 12 R) confounded the league's pitchers, earning a jaw-dropping 13 BB and 16 BB, respectively. The No Shows saw impressive campaigns from Derek Strowhouer (.800 AVG, 1.520 SLG, 14 R, 4 HR, 14 RBI), Jesse Faller (.615 AVG, 1.231 SLG, 13 R, 4 HR, 17 RBI), and male eddie Glenn Strattis (.684 AVG, 9 RBI). Alaskan Bullworms got good efforts from Gary Baker (.545 AVG, .909 SLG, 10 R) and female eddie Jess Healy (.524 AVG, .667 SLG, 7 R). Meanwhile, Dirt Dogs witnessed an outstanding performance from female eddie Tess Frelick (.760 AVG, .793 OBP, 1.320 SLG, 16 R, 3 2B, 3 HR, 13 RBI, 4 BB) and obtained additional support from Erick Myers (.667 AVG, .905 SLG), Lawrence Jarrett (.579 AVG, 1.158 SLG, 10 R, 10 RBI), and female eddie Danielle Stoduto (.550 AVG, .600 SLG, 8 RBI). Top performances from Hit & Run came from male eddies Kevin Ryan (.654 AVG, .885 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B) and Neal Hebert (.583 AVG, .655 OBP, 8 R, 5 BB). For JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery, male eddie John Rubin (.692 AVG, 808 SLG, 9 R, 3 2B, 8 RBI) and Dan Croak (.542 AVG, .917 SLG, 16 RBI) did their best to keep their team in the mix. Breaking Bat saw explosive efforts from Jesse Swan (.682 AVG, 1.682 SLG, 17 R, 4 2B, 22 RBI), whose 6 HR led the league, Chris Lloyd (.792 AVG, 1.292 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 11 RBI), and Joe Russo (.778 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 13 R, 9 RBI), but it wasn't enough to qualify the team for the postseason. The A-flight playoffs featured a relatively close game, with #1 seed Hagan's Heroes hanging on over #2 seed The No Shows (8-5), and advancing to the finals. In the B-flight playoff series, #5 seed Hit & Run unseated #4 seed Dirt Dogs in a blowout (24-8). However, they narrowly fell to #3 seed Alaskan Bullworms (13-12) in the semifinals, giving the latter a B-flight finals berth.

A-Flight and B-Flight Championships In the A-flight championship, Wackers came ready to play, convincingly besting an impressive Hagan's Heroes team in a two-game sweep (24-4, 17-8). Most impressive for Wackers were Jarrett Kerns (.714 AVG, 1.929 SLG, 8 R, 3 3B, 3 HR, 10 RBI) and Sean Nonemacher (.846 AVG, 1.538 SLG, 9 R, 6 RBI), while Hagan's Heroes were led by Gary Thompson (.857 AVG, 1.286 SLG, 3 R), Jay Pane (.429 AVG, .857 SLG, 5R), and Chase Luxton (.500 AVG, .800 SLG, 5 R). The B-flight finals proceeded with I'd Hit That coming out on top of Alaskan Bullworms, also in a two-game sweep (11-8, 14-3), earning them their first title since 2017. Top playoff hitters for I'd Hit That were Matt Jacobsen (.545 AVG, 1.545 SLG, 4 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI), male eddie Roger Sternfeld (.818 AVG, 4 R), Mauricio Calero (.700 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 4 R, 4 RBI), and Robert Garcia (.700 AVG, .900 SLG, 5 R, 4 RBI). Gary Baker (.750 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 7 R) and Evan Morris (.727 AVG, .909 SLG, 5 R) posted valiant playoff efforts for Alaskan Bullworms. Congratulations to I'd Hit That for their spring season title win, and to Wackers for back-to-back A-flight championships dating back to Fall 2021!

SUMMER Several teams left the league for the summer frame, including B-flight champs I'd Hit That, but a couple new ones joined, ultimately resulting in a 13-team Sunday Afternoon Coed slate. Again, the divisions were aligned into balanced American and National Conferences employing the same playoff structure as in the spring season.

American League Having an undefeated spring season only to be swept in the championship series, Hagan's Heroes were eager to turn things around in the summer season. They charged to a 7-1 record, again securing the #1 seed. Defending spring A-flight champion Wackers (6-1-1) were right behind with the #2 seed, setting up a compelling A-flight semifinal matchup. Dirt Dogs (4-3-1), Nihilators (4-4), and Hit & Run (2-4-2) rounded out the playoff field, while Slap A Pitch (0-8) underperformed. Elijah Robinson (.640 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 10 R) of Dirt Dogs led with 18 RBI, while teammates Erick Myers (.640 AVG, .840 SLG, 9 R, 10 RBI), female eddies Tess Frelick (.545 AVG, .727 SLG, 10 R, 11 RBI) and Danielle Stoduto (.471 AVG, .609 OBP, 6 R, 6 RBI, 6 BB), and male eddie Scott Montgomery (.471 AVG, .591 OBP, 11 R, 5 BB) bolstered the lineup. For Nihilators, male eddie Brian Chester (.824 AVG, 1.353 SLG, 13 R, 3 3B, 11 RBI) had an excellent season and Jake Hohenstein (.600 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 11 RBI) provided support. Hit & Run made the playoffs on the strength of campaigns by Shane Mulvihill (.704 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 11 R, 5 2B, 12 RBI), Brian Randazzo (.714 AVG, 1.036 SLG, 12 R, 6 2B, 9 RBI), Matt Korn (.571 AVG, 1.048 SLG, 8 R, 3 HR, 16 RBI), and female eddie Dawn Lyman (.571 AVG, .667 SLG, 2 2B). Though they sat out the postseason, Kevin Riffel (.565 AVG, .870 SLG, 9 R, 4 2B) was a bright spot for Slap A Pitch. In the A-flight semifinal game, #2 seed Wackers showed that their spring success was no fluke, as they shut down #1 seed Hagan's Heroes in a low-scoring affair (7-1). The B-flight bracket saw #5 seed Hit & Run triumph over #4 seed Nihilators in the guarterfinals (16 -12), then carry that momentum into a convincing semifinal victory over #3 seed Dirt Dogs (23-11). Thus, Wackers and Hit & Run would represent the American League in the A- and B-flight title series, respectively.

National League Wu Tang Forever didn't face significant resistance in the National League, and rolled to the #1 seed with a 7-1 record. No Shows (5-3) earned the #2 seed with a head-to-head win over Team EnVi (5-3), and a berth in the Aflight playoff bracket. JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery (4-4) claimed the #4 seed over Team Hunt (4-4), also based on head-to -head. Gwynedd Manufacturing (1-7) and This Is Our Hobby (1-7) finished outside of the playoff picture. Wu Tang Forever was led by the bats of Jonn Poore (.667 AVG, 1.545 SLG, 15 R), who led the league with 22 H, 9 HR, 32 RBI, and 51 TB, Brandon Birkhead (.810 AVG, 1.952 SLG, 14 R, 7 2B, 4 3B, 18 RBI), Chris Hackney (.655 AVG, 1.172 SLG, 20 R, 6 2B, 23 RBI), male eddie Tom Egitto (.762 AVG, .905 SLG, 12 R, 11 RBI), and female eddies Chelsea Detwiler (.545 AVG, .636 SLG, 8 R, 2 2B), Katie Cherba (.435 AVG, .565 SLG, 8 R, 6 RBI), and Gina Tyson (.500 AVG, .522 OBP, 12 R, 9 RBI). Derek Strowhouer (.609 AVG, .654 OBP, 1.522 SLG, 13 R, 7 HR, 23 RBI), CJ Koysoni (.667 AVG, .720 OBP, 1.238 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 12 RBI), male eddies Glenn Strattis (.762 AVG, .952 SLG, 8 R, 12 RBI) and Steve Gottesman (.733 AVG, .871 OBP, 10 R, 10 RBI, 6 BB), and female eddie Monique Dirks (.522 AVG, .609 SLG, 6 R, 2 2B, 6 RBI) certainly showed up for No Shows. Matt Shubert (.739 AVG, .769 OBP, 16 R, 6 2B, 6 HR, 26 RBI, 45 TB) had a monster season for Team EnVi, leading the league with 1.957 SLG, while teammates Jon Williams (.700 AVG, .867 SLG, 13 R, 15 RBI), Mike Carr (.710 AVG, 15 R, 12 RBI), and female eddie Laura Albertson (.500 AVG, .632 OBP, 5 BB) gave the lineup some depth. JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery was led by Jason Genua (.684 AVG, 1.105 SLG, 10 R) and Tom Kluge (.600 AVG, 1.050 SLG, 10 R, 15 RBI), while Christian Butrica (.667 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 13 R, 6 2B, 10 RBI), Nic Pataki (.600 AVG, 1.150 SLG, 14 R, 9 RBI), male eddie Bob Louderback (.696 AVG, .913 SLG, 8 R, 15 RBI), and female eddie Dawn Cardinal (.522 AVG, 5 R, 9 RBI) had fine seasons for Team Hunt. Gwynedd Manufacturing had no players compile a qualifying number of plate appearances, but Hunter DiDomizio (.875 AVG, 1.625 SLG, 2 HR) impressed in 4 games. Meanwhile, despite a disappointing season for This Is Our Hobby, Sean Cain (.864 OBP, .952 SLG, 10 R) claimed the batting title with a .857 AVG. In the A-flight semis, #2 seed No Shows found themselves outmatched by #1 seed Wu Tang Forever (18-9), with the latter proceeding to the title series. In the B-flight bracket, #4 seed JT Bankers Saloon & Eatery held off #5 seed Team Hunt (18-12) in the quarters, but in the semifinals narrowly fell to #3 seed Team EnVi (14-12), who would have a chance to compete for the B-flight championship.

A-Flight and B-Flight Championships In the A-flight championship, Wackers were looking to "three-peat", and claimed the early series lead with a 14-11 win over Wu Tang Forever in Game 1. Game 2 was an epic lasting 9 innings, with Wu Tang Forever climbing back into the series (15-14). In the end, Wackers endured, taking Game 3 (15-9) and securing their third consecutive Sunday Afternoon Coed A-flight title. The superhuman postseason performance of Wu Tang Forever's Brandon Birkhead (.786 AVG, .824 OBP, 2.929 SLG, 13 R, 10 HR, 19 RBI) in tandem with the contributions of Jonn Poore (.571 AVG, 1.643 SLG, 9 R, 5 HR, 7 RBI) was not enough to overcome the balanced attack of the Wackers' Jarrett Kerns (.545 AVG, 1.636 SLG, 6 R, 4 HR, 9 RBI), Ty Allen (.625 AVG, 1.063 SLG, 6 R, 3 2B, 2 3B), and female eddie Lissa Tercha (.643 AVG, .857 SLG, 4 R, 1 HR, 3 RBI). In the B-flight, Hit & Run carried out a blitz of Team EnVi, doubling their score in the first game (32-16) and executing a 6-inning mercy-rule killing in the second (16-1), earning a B-flight title just as they did in Summer 2021. The hot playoff bats of Brian Randazzo (.778 AVG, 1.611 SLG, 8 R, 7 2B, 2 HR, 22 RBI), Matt Korn (.611 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 11 R, 4 HR, 10 RBI), Adam Hebert (.833 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 14 R, 2 3B, 7 RBI), and Shane Mulvihill (.500 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 9 R, 5 HR, 15 RBI) aided the champs, while Team EnVi relied on Matt Shubert (.714 AVG, 2.000 SLG, 4 R, 3 HR, 9 RBI) during their playoff run. Congratulations to Hit & Run for their summer season crown, and to Wackers for making it 3 in a row!

FALL The Sunday Afternoon Coed league held steady at 13 teams for the fall season. The final games of 2022 were played on October 30th, actually at the very same time of day that the Philadelphia Eagles beat the Pittsburgh Steelers to improve their record to 7-0.

the teams playing against one another one time. And with the field at School Road Hatfield coming online on April 13th, it was possible to schedule all of the games in a 6-week period. Dom Anzideo (.682 AVG, .773 SLG, 7 RBI), Drew Stoney (.588 AVG, .882 SLG, 8 R), and Justin Ip (.591 AVG, .682 SLG, 7 R, 11 RBI) led the charge for The Gabagools, and Team Wasted Talent benefitted from the efforts of Kyle Ortiz (.630 AVG, 10 R, 7 RBI), Matt Schwartz (.583 AVG, .958 SLG, 4 3B), Ryan Cantwell (.524 AVG, 1.095 SLG, 8 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI), and Ant Russo (.563 AVG, 1.375 SLG, 7 R, 3 HR, 12 RBI). Tom Hinchliffe, III (.462 AVG, .538 SLG), Jay Stover (.400 AVG, 2 2B), and Jason Hertz (.385 AVG, 2 2B, 5 RBI) were the top performers for Penn among their massive roster of 20 players.

Playoffs In an exciting start to the playoffs, #1 seed Tap Daddy's held on in a close one against #4 seed Team Wasted Talent (19-16) to advance to the finals. Meanwhile, #3 seed The Gabagools edged by #2 seed Red Stallion (17-16) to set the finals pairing. In the finals at Eureka Quarry, Tap Daddy's emerged victorious in Game 1, another narrowly decided affair (4-2), but then pulled out all the stops and overwhelmed The Gabagools in Game 2 (24-6). Ed Milisits (.667 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 3 RBI) and Nick Geraghty (.667 AVG, .714 OBP, 3 R, 4 RBI) were playoff performers for The Gabagools, but Brady West (.769 AVG, 1.538 SLG, 6 R, 3 HR, 11 RBI), Joe Franschetti (.778 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 7 R, 3 2B), and Andrew Gernert (.500 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 5 R, 3 3B, 12 RBI) carried Tap Daddy's to victory. Congratulations to Tap Daddy's as the first champions of SBA's Wednesday Evening Men's league!

FALL The Wednesday Evening Coed league, counterpart to the Wednesday Evening Men's league, shrunk by one team for the fall session. This offered an opportunity to grow the Men's league from 5 to 7 teams, and Warriors, The Reserves, and Doc's Irish Pub were added to the group, while Penn Engineering vacated their team slot. This resulted in a 15-team schedule across the two leagues, extending the regular season from 8 weeks to 9, given the available field slots on Wednesday evenings, but risk of a protracted fall season seemed minimal since opening day was to be August 3rd. As it turned out, the weather largely cooperated and play concluded on October 12th, well in advance of the colder temperatures. The addition of two new teams also expanded the playoff structure to include 5 teams, again following a standard single-elimination format with a best-of-3 final series.

Doc's Irish Pub (4-4, 109 RGU) and The Gabagools (4-4, 122 RGU) split their regular season encounters, so Doc's Irish Pub got the nod for the #4 seed on the basis of seasonal runs-against, while The Gabagools rounded out the playoff picture as the #5 seed. Two of the newer teams, The Reserves (2-6) and Warriors (1-7) couldn't break into the top 5, and got a head start on their off-season. Alec Lashkevich (.800 OBP, 1.359 SLG, 3 HR, 25 RBI) had a monster season for Tap Daddy's, leading the league with a .795 AVG, 23 R, 31 H, 9 2B, and 53 TB. Teammates Andrew Gernert (.743 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 20 R, 7 2B, 4 HR, 27 RBI, 49 TB), Brady West (.667 AVG, 1.139 SLG, 19 R, 4 HR, 16 RBI), and Cooper Rosiak (.733 AVG, 1.200 SLG, 16 R, 5 2B, 3 HR, 11 RBI) significantly added to the attack. Team Wasted Talent boasted the trio of Ryan Logan (.759 AVG, 1.241 SLG, 14 R, 4 3B, 20 RBI), Nick Smalley (.690 AVG, 1.276 SLG, 13 R, 3 3B, 3 HR, 17 RBI), and Matt Schwartz (.639 AVG, .889 SLG, 18 R, 17 RBI). Chris Crookham (.750 AVG, 1.500 SLG, 1 R, 6 2B, 3 HR, 17 RBI) and Tom Jacob (.524 AVG, 1.333 SLG, 8 R, 4 HR, 10 RBI) powered Red Stallion. AJ Bagushinski (.594 AVG, .906 SLG, 15 R, 6 2B) and Dylan Brooks (.500 AVG, 1.214 SLG, 12 R, 23 RBI), the league leader with 5 HR, led the way for Doc's Irish Pub. Tom Salami (.607 AVG, 1.214 SLG, 12 R, 6 2B, 3 HR, 20 RBI) and Jon Dobyan (.517 AVG, .828 SLG, 10 R, 4 2B, 8 RBI) kept The Gabagools in the mix. Though the Reserves missed the postseason, Joe Bisceglie (.571 AVG, .929 SLG, 11 R, 3 3B, 12 RBI) was a bright spot, as was James Markel (.591 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 13 R, 8 RBI) for Warriors.

Playoffs The playoffs commenced with #4 seed Doc's Irish Pub shutting down #5 seed The Gabagools (20-0), but they encountered stiff resistance in the semifinals against the #1 seed Tap Daddy's (16-4). With the win, Tap Daddy's would have a chance to repeat as the league champs. #3 seed Red Stallion came out on top of #2 seed Team Wasted Talent in the other semifinal game (14-10), setting the stage for the best-of-3 finals. At the Quarry field, Red Stallion took the early series lead with a Game 1 win (17-10). But Tap Daddy's fought back, dropping a 30-spot in Red Stallion in Game 2 (30-14). Red Stallion regrouped and came out swinging in Game 3, emerging victorious with a 22-12 performance to claim the crown. Mike Divona (.737 AVG, 1.105 SLG, 5 R, 5 2B, 9 RBI), Alec Lashkevich (.667 AVG, 1.278 SLG, 11 R, 3 2B, 2 HR, 16 RBI), Joe Franschetti (.579 AVG, .947 SLG, 7 R, 3 3B, 7 RBI), John Gambone (.650 AVG, 10 R, 6 RBI), and Brady West (.526 AVG, .895 SLG, 11 R, 2 3B, 8 RBI) swung the hot playoff bats for Tap Daddy's, while Ryan Nakonieszny (.714 AVG, 1.429 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 2 HR, 10 RBI), Tom Jacob (.643 AVG, 1.429 SLG, 5 R, 5 2B, 2 HR, 12 RBI), Justin Gutierrez (.643 AVG, 1.357 SLG, 6 R, 2 HR, 10 RBI), Brian Graham (.688 AVG, .813 SLG, 9 R), and Brett Broderick (.600 AVG, 1.300 SLG, 7 R, 6 RBI) led Red Stallion to softball glory. Congratulations to Red Stallion for their fall championship!

– scoring at a clip of 56%. Kevin also topped Jarred Garner as the best all-time RBI% leader—knocking in a run 77% of the time. As far as the frequency with which a HR is hit, Shawn Hines has replaced Jarred Gardner atop the list. Shawn hammers one out in better than 1 in every 5 times to the plate. Frank Hackett (retired) held the all-time batting leader title with a 674 lifetime average for many years until Kevin Roche reset the mark to 676 after the 2022 season. As far as slugging percentage is concerned, Mike Haberle (retired) was the extra base leader with a whopping 1472 SLG% until Kevin elevated that mark to 1516. Matt Schaub has taken over as the base on balls leader, getting a free pass 393 times in his career. Nobody has a better base on balls average than Mike Sauler who earns a free pass better than 1 in 4 trips to the plate (28%).

Coed League Career Milestones

John Razzi (retired) remains the coed leader in games-played (1,668) and at-bats (4,932). Keith Keppley holds the lead in all-time hits (2,796). In doing so, he crossed the plate more than any player in coed history (2,455). Keith also has the most doubles by a mile (837) and triples (305) along with the most RBIs (2,271). Nobody scores a coed league run at a better clip (60%) than Jarrett Kerns and Mike Chwieroth (retired). When it comes to coed slugging, Jarred Gardner is king, but my gut tells me he will have some company at the top once a guy known as Birky reaches the 500 at-bat requirement. Jarred has hit more than 500 dingers in his coed career. Jon Poore is the closest with 341. CJ Motts has now become the all-time batting average leader (733), supplanting Jarred Gardner. In the base on balls department, Kris Pulli has overtaken long-time league member Christen Flaherty (retired) as the all-time base on balls leader 467. Rhiannon Keppley is now in sole possession of the keenest eye lead with a walk in 1 out of 5 trips to the plate.

Triple Crowns

Any player that reaches a career plateau of 500 or 1,000 career runs, career hits, and career RBIs shall earn a 500 or 1,000 Triple Crown award. Before last year, 51 men's league players had reached the Triple Crown 500 plateau. 6 have reached the Triple Crown 1,000 mark. 66 coed league players have made it to the Triple Crown 500 level while 9 have gotten to the coed Triple Crown 1,000 milestone. In 26 years of SBA existence, 7 league members have managed the incredible feat of acquiring what I call the Double Triple Crown—500 or more RUNS, HITS and RBIs in both the men's and coed leagues. Those seven players are, in order of acquisition, Rob Johnson, Keith Keppley, Steph Garret, Jarred Gardner, Tim O'Shea, Jr., Warren Grant, and Gene Walczak. Move over fellas and make room for John Erb who made the grade in 2022.

In the men's league, Marc McKinney was the first to reach Triple Crown 500 status back in 2004. He has just surpassed the 1,000 mark in Runs, Hits and RBIs. With his 63 RBIs last year, Tom Ivers has earned TC500 status. Chris Beatty will take home a TC500 plaque this year as will Dave Dancer and Mike Bitterlich. With his 81 Runs and 107 RBIs, John Erb has now become only the 8th player in league history to reach the TC500 plateau in both the men's and coed leagues.

A number of men's league players are currently on the Triple Crown doorstep. Shawn Rush needs 31 RBIs. As a perrenial leadoff hitter, that will be a tall order. With 19 RBIs in 2023, Frank Staber will attain TC1000 status to join only 7 others in league history. Glen Hipple, Jeff Hess, Chris Hackney, Ryan Maley need only a handful of RBIs to get to the TC500 Promise Land while Chris Knechel needs to cross the plate only 4 times.

On the coed side of things, Gary Thompson's 30 RBIs last year has moved him into the coveted Triple Crown arena. Mike Zahradnick and Carl Motts, Jr. will join the TC500 club as well.

best team in that division by a landslide and I'm curious why we would play a softball game at a field that only allows you to hit 3 home runs when that is what our team does so it puts at a complete disadvantage for that game twice we hit home runs that would have taken the lead or tied the game. Makes no sense to me what so ever it's softball those are not real rules. I've played in the A league they have no "home run rule" and whoever the ump is behind home plate is terrible.

Reply from the league office...

Let me see if I've got this straight. You are blaming your playoff loss yesterday on the ball field and the game umpire. Yet, just a few games ago you played at the very same ball field with the very same umpire vs. the very same team and won the game rather handily - all without a peep. I find that quite revealing, don't you?

You want me to believe your playing the game with only 8 (because 2 of your team's 10 roster players failed to show up) had absolutely nothing to do with the loss. You want me to believe taking a batting out in the 9th spot had nothing to do with the loss. You want me to believe hitting a paltry 324 (12/37) as a team had nothing to do with the loss. You want me to believe your 2 ground outs to the pitcher had nothing to do with the loss. But, because you hit a fly ball that barely traveled 265' and are called out for it, that cost you the game. I am sitting here scratching my head in amazement. I guess I'm to blame as well. After all, if I never started the league, you wouldn't have had the misfortune of losing this game to begin with.

Out of courtesy to you, I will take the time to explain why there is a HR rule at the School Road Park ball field and not at the other fields. I will also explain why there is so much more to a game's outcome than a questionable umpire call or two.

Except for the Quarry ball field, most of the ball fields do not have outfield fences. This means a 265' pop fly is easily caught for an out. There is no need for a HR limit on fenceless fields. The Quarry ball field has a fence that measures in excess of 300'. This means a 265' fly ball doesn't even reach the warning track. HRs in excess of 300' are legitimate HRs, hence no HR limit is needed. The Hatfield ball field has an outfield fence that measures 240'-250' on a good day. 265' pop flies should not be awarded 4 bases. As a matter of fact, according to the ASA (Amateur Softball Association), in Class E competition ANY over the fence HR is not only an automatic out, but it ends the inning regardless of the number of outs in the inning. To reiterate, ASA rule allows for 0 HRs in Class E softball. Hitting one ENDS THE INNING.

As a compromise to the teams in the league that play at short-fenced fields and in spite of the ASA rule, I instituted what's called a 3 and 1-up HR rule. That means a team can hit 3 HRs and cannot hit another until their opponent reaches

Congratulations to Muckdogs for earning their franchise's 4th B-flight title in 4 years, and to Wu Tang Forever for making it 5 A-flight crowns in a row!

SUMMER At the start of the summer season on May 25th, league enrollment held steady at 9 teams. The Goats did not return this season, but the new powerhouse team Lung Darts entered the league, providing some threat to Wu Tang Forever's perch atop the league's competition. Custom Cabinetry Finishes fittingly changed their name to Eddies in the Outfield. With 9 teams, the round-robin scheduling format again made perfect sense, and the postseason format was slightly amended to accommodate only 6 teams this time – the A-flight championship series for the #1 and #2 seeds, and the #3 through #6 seeds competing in a B-flight playoff tournament.

Regular Season Despite the increasingly competitive nature of the league, Wu Tang Forever kept their incredible winning streak intact, posting yet another 8-0 regular season record. While they matched their seasonal team output of 168 runs from the spring, they did allow 53 runs, nearly twice as many as in the spring (27 runs). To the surprise of only those who overlook what a truly good team Eddies in the Outfield (6-2) is, Lung Darts (6-2) finished as the #3 seed, having lost in their regular season meeting with Eddies in the Outfield. Thus, Wu Tang Forever would square off against Eddies in the Outfield in the A-flight final series. Mayhem (5-3) had won against Muckdogs (5-3), so the former took the #4 seed, and the latter the #5 seed. Chico's Bail Bonds (3-5) squeaked into the playoffs as the #6 seed. Doc's Irish Pub (2-6), Knuckleheads (1-7), and The Reserves (0-8) faced the disappointment of a longer wait for the start of the fall season. Tom Koelzer (.657 AVG, 1.657 SLG, 24 R, 58 TB) blasted 11 HR for Wu Tang Forever during the season, which incredibly was still short of leading the league, though his 36 RBI was tops. Teammates Keith Keppley (.710 AVG, 1.097 SLG, 19 R, 18 RBI), Chris Hackney (.667 AVG, .861 SLG, 25 R, 7 2B, 13 RBI), Jonn Poore (.615 AVG, 1.038 SLG, 9 R, 3 HR, 15 RBI), male eddie Ron Pulli (.615 AVG, .846 SLG, 12 R, 2 3B, 6 RBI), and female eddies Jackie Tarulli (.467 AVG, .800 SLG, 10 R, 4 2B, 2 HR, 16 RBI), Jackie Heim (.533 AVG, .600 SLG, 12 R), and Krysta Wellington (.550 AVG, .700 SLG, 10 R) also kept the Wu Tang Forever machine's wheels turning. The success of Eddies in the Outfield was driven by male eddies Shawn Ortman (.727 AVG, 1.136 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B, 10 RBI) and Lee Anderson (.700 AVG, .767 SLG, 12 R, 10 RBI), female eddies Dawn Bieber (.611 AVG, .667 SLG, 5 R, 7 RBI) and Maddi Bieber (.500 AVG, .591 SLG, 6 RBI), and Russ Laughlin (.462 AVG, 1.077 SLG, 12 R, 4 2B, 4 HR, 17 RBI). Brandon Birkhead (23 R, 35 RBI) of Lung Darts led the league with .806 AVG, .788 OBP, 2.161 SLG, 25 H, and 67 TB while setting an SBA coed single-season record by crushing 13 HR, an amazing feat. (Incidentally, teammate Pat Kelley tied that 13 HR mark in the Monday Evening Coed league, also during summer 2022.) There were many other outstanding campaigns by Lung Darts team members, but those of Shane Hanna (.645 AVG, 1.161 SLG, 23 R, 5 2B, 3 HR, 16 RBI), Sean Nonemacher (.720 AVG, 1.240 SLG, 15 R, 3 HR, 19 RBI), Pat Kelley (.704 AVG, 1.185 SLG, 14 R, 3 HR, 13 RBI), Greg Thompson (.708 SLG, .958 SLG, 8 R, 6 2B, 14 RBI), and male eddie George Dart (.600 AVG, .840 SLG, 10 R, 4 2B, 9 RBI) are of note. Mayhem got solid efforts from Jarrett Kerns (.765 AVG, 1.353 SLG, 8 R, 13 RBI), Derek Strowhouer (.652 AVG, 1.043 SLG, 10 R, 14 RBI), and Tom Hayes (.565 AVG, .957 SLG, 13 R, 11 RBI), while Muckdogs were lifted by the bats of male eddie Bill Stone (.767 AVG, .800 SLG, 16 R, 14 RBI) and Mark Danouski (.750 AVG, 1.050 SLG, 8 R, 10 RBI). Kyle Gallagher (.800 AVG, 1.360 SLG, 12 R, 4 HR,

Though they missed the playoff cut, Doc's Irish Pub saw promise from Josh Keszczyk (.632 AVG, .895 SLG, 7 R) and Austin Kooker (.591 AVG, .727 SLG, 10 R). Despite the Knuckleheads' sparing success this season, male eddie Dan Vescovi (.667 AVG, 1.476 SLG, 8 R, 4 2B, 3 HR, 13 RBI had another strong campaign. Having plated only 16 R as a team all season, The Reserves had few individual performances of note, but Sean Pena (8-for-13, 2 HR) did well with limited opportunities.

Playoffs: The A-flight final series was a rematch of the spring pairing between #1 seed Wu Tang Forever and #2 seed Eddies in the Outfield. Eddies in the Outfield gamely hung in there for the first contest, ultimately a 12-8 loss, but then found themselves overwhelmed in Game 2, a 25-3 killing administered by the powerhouse Wu Tang Forever. Their winning streak lived on, and they had their 6th in a row A-flight title in Wednesday Evening Coed. The B-flight semifinals didn't feature any really competitive games, as #3 seed Lung Darts stuck it to #6 seed Chico's Bail Bonds (22-7), and #5 seed Muckdogs easily overcame #4 seed Mayhem (22-12). In the finals, the starstudded Lung Darts fairly easily dispensed with the Muckdogs in a two-game sweep (13-9, 19-4), earning themselves the title of B-flight champs. The playoff bats of Ryan Hamilton (.556 AVG, 1.222 SLG, 3 R, 2 HR, 4 RBI) and Tony Cabot (.455 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 4 R, 2 HR, 3 RBI) aided the Muckdogs' cause, while Brandon Birkhead (.929 AVG, 2.143 SLG, 11 R, 4 2B, 2 3B, 3 HR, 9 RBI), Pat Kelley (.769 AVG, 1.385 SLG, 5 R, 2 HR, 7 RBI), Shane Hanna (.778 AVG, 1.444 SLG, 4 R, 6 RBI), Sean Nonemacher (.538 AVG, 1.077 SLG, 7 R, 2 HR, 9 RBI), Tom Rider (.800 AVG, .818 OBP, 3 R, 3 RBI), and female eddie Chelsea Detwiler (.727 AVG, 8 H) made the case for Lung Darts. Congratulations to Lung Darts for a successful inaugural season and to Wu Tang Forever for 6 consecutive top-tier championship wins!

FALL The fall season got underway on the early date of August 3rd, as some significant changes came to the list of teams enrolled in the league. Doc's Irish Pub, Knuckleheads, and The Reserves, none of which had made the playoffs in the summer frame, did not return for the fall season. However, The Chili Dogs and Penn Engineering, largely made up of members of the Penn Engineering team that competed in the Summer 2022 Wednesday Evening Men's league, were welcomed as new entries to the increasingly competitive Wednesday Evening Coed league. With the early start, the league wrapped up for the year on October 12th, despite sharing the Wednesday evening schedule with the Wednesday Evening Men's league. Muckdogs got strong contributions from Ari Silverstein (.654 AVG, 1.192 SLG, 4 HR, 17 RBI), who led the league with 18 R, Greg Hess (.778 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 11 R, 9 RBI), male eddies Bill Stone (.727 AVG, .818 SLG, 12 R, 7 RBI) and Eric Shade (.619 AVG, .714 SLG, 8 R, 13 RBI), and female eddie Erin Oosthuizen (.423 AVG, .500 SLG, 10 R, 2 2B). Eddies in the Outfield's best performances came from male eddies Mark Smith (.792 OBP, 1.000 SLG, 8 R, 12 RBI), winner of the batting title with a .818 AVG, Brian Sauers (.632 AVG, 1.105 SLG, 17 R, 3 2B, 2 HR, 11 RBI), and Lee Anderson (.606 AVG, .697 SLG, 10 R 3 2B, 6 RBI), and female eddie Dawn Bieber (.375 AVG, .417 SLG, 8 R). Wu Tang Forever saw productive campaigns from Tom Koelzer (.625 AVG, 1.625 SLG, 16 R, 4 2B, 6 HR, 22 RBI), Jake Feehan (.667 AVG, 1.111 SLG, 14 R, 5 2B), Jonn Poore (.538 AVG, 1.269 SLG, 12 R, 15 RBI), leader with 6 HR, Jay Pane (.619 AVG, 1.048 SLG, 9 R), and female eddie Jackie Tarulli (.435 AVG, .522 SLG, 5 R, 2 2B). Top producers for Chico's Bail Bonds were Greg Reilly (.704 AVG, .963 SLG, 12 R, 7 2B, 7 RBI), Kyle Lewis (.640 AVG, .960 SLG, 10 R, 9 RBI), Adam Roman (.611 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 9 R), male eddie Larry Kirschner (.652 AVG, .667 OBP, 9 R, 7 RBI), and female eddie Amy Walter (.444 AVG, .481 SLG, 5 R, 5 RBI). The Chili Dogs made the playoffs on the strength of the bats of Dan Croak (10-for-11, 5 R, 4 2B, 11 RBI), Dave Shannon (.667 AVG, 1.400 SLG, 7 R, 4 2B, 7 RBI), and Jason Genua (.579 AVG, 1.000 SLG, 9 R, 3 2B). Jarrett Kerns (.615 AVG, 1.038 SLG, 11 R, 5 2B, 15 RBI), Justin Miller (.750 AVG, 1.375 SLG, 9 RBI), and female eddie Katie Cherba (.417 AVG, .708 SLG, 8 R) provided some highlights in an otherwise disappointing season for Mayhem. Penn Engineering would be able to build on the efforts of male eddie John Mauger (.600 AVG, .800 SLG, 3 2B) and Tyler Vonpein (.583 AVG, .833 SLG, 4 R).

Playoffs: The A-flight title series wasn't a very competitive one, as Lung Darts cruised to a 2-game series win over Muckdogs (17-3, 19-5). With that, Lung Darts now had an A-flight crown to go with the B-flight title they had won in the

3 HRs. Then each team can hit a 4th HR, but cannot hit another until their opponent hits a 4th. If the other team hits a 4th, either team can hit a 5th and so on. The HR rule is a fair compromise. It allows for teams to hit HRs, but keeps things legitimate in that non-HR hitting teams don't get beat up with cheap fly balls that go over a short porch for a 4-bagger.

The next time you have the urge to point the finger, remember there are 42 outs in a 7-inning game of softball - 21 on offense and 21 on defense. I'm sure if you replay the game in your mind you will find a bunch of reasons in addition to the ones mentioned above as to why your team lost the game - all attributed to other than the ball field and/or the game umpire. You may have been the better team throughout the regular season, but you weren't the better team yesterday. If you want to know the reasons why, assemble the team in front of a mirror and take a good look. Therein lies your answer.

Bending the Rules

Email exchange with a league manager...

Manager: Do the replacement players I added to the team need to play the required 3 games to be playoff eligible? League Office: Yes, they most certainly do.

Manager: Is there any way to discuss this? The combination of the guys they replaced and the games they played equal at least 3 games. I mean these guys paid \$40 for 3 games left I don't think they should get penalized for not being able to play the playoffs. 2 guys only got 1 game in because of a rainout and a forfeit.

League Office: I'm sorry, [manager name]. I cannot break the rules and allow any player for any reason to play in the post season without 3 regular season games played. This rule has been in place since the league's inception. Forfeits count as game credits for the team receiving the forfeit. If you received a forfeit, all players on your team receive a game credit. There were 3 games left on the schedule when these replacement players signed up. It is unfortunate that they could not make the rainout. You could have taken a batting out for the missing player and he would have gotten a game credit. Not much we can do about it now.

Manager: But your rules also state that the first rain date will be scheduled the following Sunday. If you feel that its better for your league to have a forfeit in the playoffs rather then a competitive game then so be it. If they can't play in the playoffs I definitely think the \$40 should be refunded to those 2 guys.

League Office: Posted on every Sunday schedule is the following: Full rainout weeks (all games canceled) will be rescheduled at the end of the regular season. Partial rainout weeks (some games canceled) may be rescheduled for the second Saturday (if available) following the date of the rainout. It's not the league's fault that 2 of your players were suspended for
